AUTO FATALITY

AT ANDOVER

A shocking automobile accident occurred Tuesday morning at Andover when Whitmore Porter was killed. Mr. and Mrs. Porter, their niece and driver were motoring from their home at Bairdville to the village when about two and a half miles below the village on a very narrow piece of road the car skidded, going over the bank and turned over on the occupants of the car. Mrs. Porter and her niece, who were uninjured, were able to crawl from under the car and run for help. When help arrived it was found Mr. Porter had been pinned between the steering gear and some logs and death had probably been instantaneous.

Joseph Cadman, the driver, had one of his hands caught between the steering wheel and Mr. Porter's body and it was badly crushed. Besides that he was uninjured.

A particularly sad feature in connection with Mr. Porter's untimely death is that he is the last of a large family, his mother having been accidentally killed



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about a year ago. The deepest
sympathy is felt for the widow
and relatives.

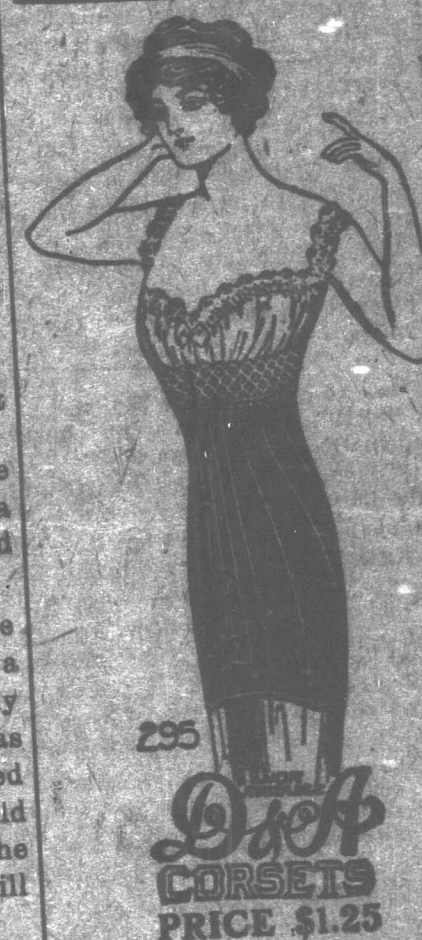
