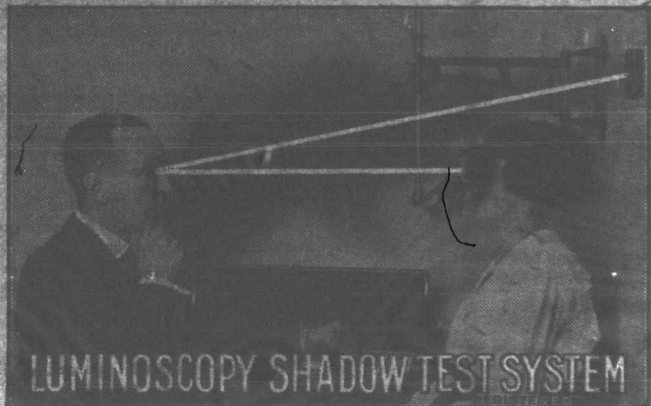

of October 11. She was coming down the hill past the Grand Central Hotel and he walked behind her. They passed two men coming up the hill. He did not know them. She walked on to the concrete bridge and turned back. He went over across the bridge and on his way back heard screams. It was about 9 o'clock. He saw St. Pierre later at the dance. He had on a grey suit.

Harvey Delaney, a train dispatcher on the Canadian National Railway, said he was in York's drug store on the night of the crime. He boarded over the drug store. He went down to the drug store at 8.30 p.m., and was having a soda with Augustine Finnemore when St. Pierre entered and introduced himself. The witness said he was going to work, and asked Finnemore if he was going along and Finnemore said "Yes." St. Pierre also went towards the post office. Finnemore left them at the telephone office and the accused and the witness crossed the bridge going in direction of the Royal Hotel. Delaney said he left St. Pierre at the top of the hill. It was about 8.50 p.m. The witness took St. Francis street to go to the railway office. St. Pierre did not say where he was going. He talked about baseball, and later said he was going to a dance. St. Pierre did not have any blood on his clothes. He was dressed neatly.

Counsel for the defense objected to a question as to how St. Pierre appeared in regard to drinking and the objection was disallowed as the witness said the prisoner appeared as a man who had been drinking. He said he did not remember seeing Alphonse Herbert in the drug store.

On cross-examination he said it was 8.45 p.m. that he last saw St. Pierre at the junction of Canada and St. Francis streets. He did not see him again that evening.

On direct examination St. Pierre had on a blue suit. He did not notice a soldier's button on the coat and it would take about fifteen minutes to walk to his work. Finnemore left them about three minutes after leaving the drug store.

Dr. F. L. Herbert was next called. On re-direct examination he said there was no hole in the accused's sleeve. There was a spot on the sleeve that the accused said was blood. On a question as to whether the train of his story at the coroner's inquest was broken by being asked questions by members of the jury Counsel LeBlanc objected.
