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## SYNOD IS OVER.

Church Parliament Concluded Its Session With an Interesting Missionary Meeting.

Upon motion of Mr. W. M. Jarvis it was ordered that the canons be printed and distributed among the clergy and delegates to Synod.

The salary of the treasurer of Synod, Mr. W. E. Smith, was fixed at \$500, and of the secretary, Rev. O. S. Newnham, at \$100.

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Mr. W. M. Jaryis read the report of the 19th Century Thanksgiving Fund, and also a letter from the Primate of Canada approving of the scheme. Re-port adopted.

Upon motion of the Sunday School Committee the Bishop was requested to set apart one day each year for special intercession on behalf of Sun-day Schools.

Archdeacon Neales presented the

Archdeacon Neales presented the report of the committee on the Lord Bishop's address, which was adopted.

Very Rev. Dean Partridge and Mr.

A. C. Fairweather were appointed upon the governing board of King's

College.

Mr. Justice Hanington was appointed a trustee of Edgehill, the Church School for Girls.

The usual votes of thanks were extended to His Lordship the Bishop, the trustees of Crurch Hall, the citizens of Fredericton and the press.

#### Evening Meeting."

The annual meeting of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church of England was held at Church Hall last evening. Very Rev. Dean Partridge presiding. Appropriate missionary hymns were sung. Venerable Archdeacon Neales delivered an interesting and concise address explaining the objects of the Society.

Canon Forsythe read the report of the Society for last year.

The committee reported that the amount received for the various objects of the Society had been \$1,288.42. In addition to this \$440.52 had been remitted directly to the general treasury.

The growth of the mission work in the diocese of Algoma is endeavoring to raise a sustentation fund of \$50,000. The opportunities for mission work in the great North West were forefuly

to raise a sustentation fund of \$30,000. The opportunities for mission work in the great North West were forefoly pointed out and the church was urged to be faithful to her duties and responsibilities, in this respect. There had been a falling off in the contributions to the North West Missions, although the contribution from Fredericton had increased \$577.493. Touching the Foreign Mission field the work in Japan was encouragingly spoken of, and it was stated that \$10,000 per year is required for that work. The Chinese field was reviewed and the openings and opportunities for work there pointed out. The promising field in South Africa was touched upon. Rev. Mr. Harslem, curate at the

Rev. Mr. Harslem, curate at the Stone Church, St. John, delivered an eloquent, forceful, and comprehensive address upon foreign missions, making a strong appeal on. behalf of missions in the foreign field. Rev. Mr. Harslam stated that he intended going to India next year to engage in missionary work. He moved a resolution calling upon churchmen throughout Canada to exercise greater zeal and generosity in the missionary cause. The resolution was seconded by Mr. W. M. Jarvis in an address full of interest and strong appeal on behalf of missions.
Rev. J. A. Richardson spoke for

Rev. J. A. Richardson spoke for domestic missions and made an earnest and eloquent plea for western Canada. The next speaker was Mr. J. B. Burchill, M. P. P., who urged that every churchman was a member of the Missionary Society and should live up to his duties and responsibilities. His address was peculiarly interesting and closely listened to.

A generous contribution for the Missionary Society was taken up.
