CARROT PUDDING

Scrape, cook and mash four medium-sized carrets, add nine tablespoons of flour, four tablespoons of brown sugar, two tablespoons of chopped suet, one-half cup of chopped nuts, one cup of seeded raisins, one cup of currants, one-half cup of candied or fresh orange and lemon peel (the candied is preferable), one teaspoon of cinnamon, one-half lemon peel (the candied is preferable), one teaspoon of cinnamon, one-half teaspoon of allspice, one-quarter cup of brandy and one teaspoon of soda dissolved in a little water.
