CHAPTER VII.

CHAPTER VIII.

Cirrus clouds always move from a region where a storm is in progress toward a region of fair weather. 5. Cumulus clouds always move from a region where a storm is forming. 6. When cirrus clouds are moving rapidly from the north or northeast, there will be rain within twenty-four hours, no matter how cold it is. 7. When cirrus clouds are moving rapidly from the south or southeast they will be a harbinger of the storm, if it be in the winter there will be a snow storm. 8. The wind always blows in a circle round a storm, and when it blows from the north the heaviest rain is east of you; if it blows from the south, the heaviest rain is west of you; if it blows from the east the heaviest rain is south. 9. The wind never blows unless rain is in the air, and when it blows from the north it is a sign of rain. 10. Whenever heavy white frost occurs a storm is forming within a thousand miles of you. This is about as far as popular weather prophecy has yet advanced. It is not a very great distance, to be sure, but then it is much better than trusting to the guess work of almanac predictions, which are made up a year or more in advance.

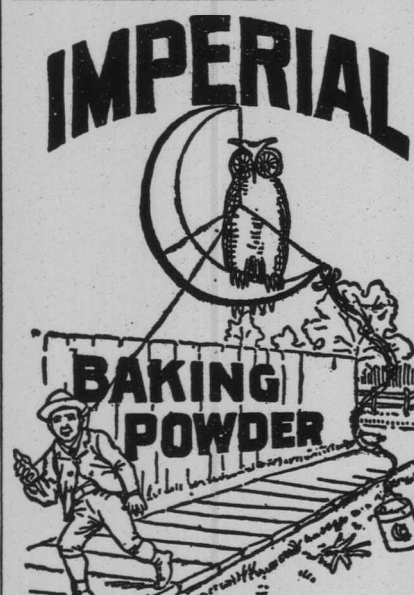

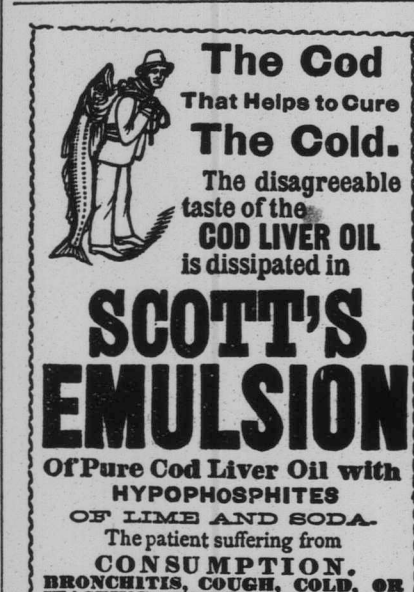
