Professionals in wheat were heavy sellers during the morning in the sharp drop in price in Paris and the general bearish feeling in the trade. Reported frosts in the Canadian Northwest where a portion of the crop is still subject to much damage concealed a partial recovery. A change to unfavorable weather in France drove shorts to cover and sent prices higher. All of the early losses wheat market was off as much as 2c every minister in the church, where early and closed only % to 1 % c lower. August flour, however, was 3% c higher in that market and the de ferred months were 1 1/2c better. Liverpool wheat was ¼d higher to unchanged, and spot was unchanged to 1/2 d higher.
