CRIPPEN TRIAL.

Defence Dispute the Identity of Remains

DR. CRIPPEN WILL TESTIFY.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Oct. 20.

A morning paper to-day finds dramatic revelation in the line of defense from the evidence submitted yesterday at the Crippen trial. Towards the close of a long cross-examination of Prof. Pepper, Chief Counsel Tobin, representing the defendant, obtained Pepper's admission that the presence of a sebaceous gland in the alleged scar found in a portion of the dismembered body would prove that it was not a scar. Counsel Tobin thereupon announced that he hoped to prove by expert evidence the actual presence of such a gland. The importance of the point lies in the fact that identification of the remains hinged on proving the existence of the scar from an operation. Drs. Marshall and Spitzberg, medical experts, who examined the human parts unearthed the evidence which they had given in the Lower Court. This was in confirmation of the testimony given yesterday by Professor Pepper the pathologist, who swore that the flesh was human, but that he could not determine by anatomy the sex of the victim. The cross-examination of experts in which Lord Chief Justice Alverstone who is presiding took part, centered on the alleged scar on the body, which the defense declared was only a wound in the skin. Alfred Aspinall Tobin, Chief Counsel for Crippen, pled Spitzberg and Marshall with searching inquiries, but the medical men were not shaken from their assertion that the mark had been left by the wound of an operation and no sebaceous gland was discovered in the scar area. Spitzberg agreed that if the presence of sebaceous gland was established it would be conclusive evidence that the mark was not a scar. Crippen paler than at any time before, followed the evidence with strained interest. Dr. William H. Wilcox, the scientific analyst of the Home Office, testified to having discovered in the body a poison which he was satisfied had been taken through the mouth and was the cause of death. This poison was not used by homophathists, which was suggested by the defense. The medical evidence closed the case for the prosecution, and as the site in the courtroom as Mr. Tobin rose to address the court showed the keen interest with which the announcement of the line of defense was awaited. This interest was whetted by the first sentence of counsel who confirmed this earlier statements, of the Press that Crippen would enter the witness box immediately when his Attorney had concluded his address. Medical witnesses would follow, Mr. Tobin said one of these, who had the highest reputation as a microscopic expert, would give conclusive reasons why the mark on the skin was not a scar similarly an authority on the subject would say the body might be easily animal. Alkaloid developed after death. The defense, as now known, definitely will attempt to prove that the body found in the Crippen home was not that of his wife. Mrs. Crippen had undergone a surgical operation, the prosecution claims to have found only a portion of a body scar corresponding to she would left on Mrs. Crippen's body by the surgeon's knife. In this way they have sought to establish the identification. The defense maintain that it was not a scar, that was found, but rather a fold in the skin, and under cross-examination secured from the prosecution's medical expert witnesses the admission that if the presence of a sebaceous gland on the scar area could be established, it would be conclusive evidence that the mark was not a scar. It was decided to-day to place Dr. Hawley H. Crippen on the witness stand and let him tell his own story of the disappearance of his wife Belle Elmore, the actress, whose murder he is charged with. There has been speculation as to whether Crippen would testify for himself, and the decision of his counsel was not made known until just before the resumption of the trial this morning, when Arthur Newton, announced to the press that this course had been determined wise from the standpoint of the defendant's interest.

Cable News.

There are rumors of a cabinet crisis. The Minister of War, Finance and Public Works, it is believed, will resign.

The statement is published in the newspapers here that the steamer Araguaya, from Southampton, Sept. 26th, and Lisbon, Oct. 3rd, is on quarantine at this port; several deaths from cholera having occurred amongst the immigrants aboard.

A fire started in the Chicago Alton Freight House on the river front and spread rapidly to neighbouring structures of like character, causing a loss of more than \$500,000, early this morning.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Oct. 20.

As anticipated the Bank of England to-day raised its rate of discount from 4 to 5 per cent, in order to protect its reserve, which had been steadily depleted, despite the imposition of the 4 per cent three weeks ago. The reserve this week is expected to show nearly \$10,000,000 decrease. The Egyptian demand already has exceeded the estimates owing to the hasty marketing of the large cotton crop.

India is expected to take gold soon, and the South American demand possibly will appear early, and as very little gold from the mines is going to the Bank of England, a strong protective measure was necessary. A fresh outbreak of speculation in America and the large number of American Finance Bills placed here also are factors to be reckoned with in the monetary situation of the future.

The New Stamp Issue.

The One Ready for Issue When Edward Died Will Be Destroyed.

It will interest the postage stamp collectors to learn that the twopenny stamp of the new design which was ready for issue at the time of the death of King Edward VII., but not placed on sale, is not to be circulated for use. The post office authorities have decided, a correspondent is informed, to destroy the entire stock of the new stamps, of which large numbers have been printed. Perhaps a few copies may be retained in the Post Office Museum or sent to the British Museum, but in any case the particular stamp is likely to rank among the great philatelic rarities, and will probably be considered as the scarcest of all the British stamps.
