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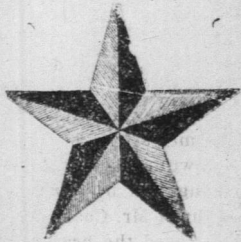

A Few More Words From Mary

ON THE POLITICAL SITUATION AND THE TACTICS USED BY THE MORRIS PARTY TO HOLD POWER.

hopes to agan hoodwink the people and get access to the revenue of the country for another four years. Of course they are saying very little in the papers about the fishermen. Ah, no, that would never pay. They know full well that the fishermen are the backbone of the country and the fishery is its mainstay, and they also know that their agricultural exhibitions, public buildings and their own fat salaries as well would all fall flat if the hardy toiler did not do their oil clothes and secure the treasures of the deep. But they are after Mr. Coaker, the fishermen's hero and the country's fishermen's friend. The fishermen were a downtrodden lot, and were very little thought of by our so-called upper ten, until Mr. Coaker came in the field. He used the brains that Providence has blessed him with for a good purpose—to uplift these men and place them on an equal footing with the best people in the land. Yes, and has even given them a chance to rise as high as the highest in the land. Did it ever occur to ye fishermen the reason every man who is carrying on a business, big or small, objected to the Union stores

They had a big profit on the goods sold on the cash price, and when goods were charged to fishermen a much higher rate was charged. On the other hand the fish was taken at the lowest possible price, and the poor downtrodden fisherman was powerless to help it. But now Mr. Coaker comes in the Field and Changes All This.

He sees a remedy by opening Union stores, and while the toiler of the deep is able to get his goods as low as any other man, he is able to get a high price for his products. Mr. Coaker has accomplished wonders and his organization is yet in its infancy. No more will the upper ten be able to laugh at "Garge," as has been done in St. John's and Harbor Grace, for

George will be able to come out of his trap skiff, put his oil clothes and long boots to the one side for a few days, and together with other able men go to our legislative halls and make laws to govern his native country, laws that will benefit his fishermen friends as well as others. Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

TOKIO, Sept. 29.
The apology of General Chang Hsun to the Japanese Consulate at Nanking, has related the air, according to Japanese officials here, and removed danger of complications for the present.

POUGHKEEPSIE, Sept. 29.

Three thousand passengers of the steamer Methwak, of the Manhattan Navigation Company, were transferred from that vessel early to-day after she had gone aground on an embankment off Hyde Park, seven miles north of here. The boat struck shortly before midnight, but at two o'clock this morning the transfer had been effected. In a panic which followed the grounding several passengers were slightly hurt.

LONDON, Sept. 29.

The practical dissolution of the Chinese Loan agreement by which the five Powers concerned were given a monopoly of certain Chinese loans and from which the United States Government withdrew, is announced. The British Government took the initiative in the dissolution agreement because of the failure of the other Powers to observe its spirit. They had made the agreement, according to British officials simply an instrument against the interests of British financiers. The five Powers will still act together in making loans to the Chinese Government for general administrative purposes, but each Power has been left free to support any of its citizens' floating loans for railroads and other industrial projects for provincial purposes. The original project was declared to be to prevent an international scramble to lend China money, but such scramble is in progress. A dissatisfied faction of British financiers thinking their Government was using its influence to prevent them from bidding, compelled the Foreign Office to withdraw from the quintuple monopoly the support that had hitherto been given to those banks participating in the quintuple loan to China.

Obituary.

Yesterday there passed away at Grand Falls, Mrs. Leah Rendell, of Heart's Content. She was on a visit to her son, Mr. Bela Rendell, in the Paper City. Up to Saturday she had enjoyed good health, and it came as a shock when after two days' illness, she passed away. Mrs. Rendell formerly Miss Leah Rowe, of Heart's Content, was the widow of the late Mr. Giles Rendell, of the Cable Town, who died some six years ago. She is survived by 6 sons and 3 daughters: Mrs. James Fox, of Harbour Grace; Mrs. John Warren, of Heart's Content; Mrs. Peacock, of Gardiner, Mass.; James of this city; Bela and Giles, of Grand Falls; Harry, of Everett, Mass.; Tolson and Charles, of Heart's Content; also 12 grandchildren. The remains left Grand Falls last night accompanied by her two sons from there. At Briggs Junction they will be joined by Mr. James Rendell and be conveyed to Heart's Content where the burial will take place, amongst those with whom she had spent her 72 years, and by whom she will long be held in loving memory, for her goodness and kindness. To the sorrowing family we extend sympathy in their sudden bereavement.

The chr. M. E. Schwartz, owned by J. Penny & Sons, arrived from Lisbon on the 26th inst., with a cargo of salt, 23 days passage. Schr. Louisa A. W., owned by same firm, arrived same day from Oporto with a cargo of onions, passage 20 days.

Mr. E. Simmons' schooner Studland, is now ready for St. John's. She has on board a cargo of fish.

Rev. Mr. Sinclair, of St. Andrew's Church, being unwell yesterday, was only able to conduct one service in the church. We are glad to hear the rev. gentleman is somewhat better to-day.

The whaler Port Saunders arrived with two finback whales on Saturday. This gives her a total for the season of 18 whales. Harbor Grace profits but very little by this whaling station. Even the birch brooms and spruce for the beer is supplied by the regular staff. Poor Quick. It's a pity you're a Harbor Gracian, otherwise you would possibly be given the spruce, and birch broom portion of the company's trade.

Mr. Selby Parsons arrived from Grand Bank by last Thursday's train.

Miss Carrie McKay arrived by the s.s. Kyle on Saturday morning from Twillingate, after a pleasant visit of six weeks to that very pretty town. While there she was the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Adam Pond.

It appears like a backward step to be placing kerosene oil lamps around the town, particularly where the electric lights are available. It seems now that electric lights are for the town proper, kerosene oil lamps (that go out before 10 o'clock) for the hills; why not give those still further in a few cod-oil lamps?
