## Spend as Usual.

In the Governor's Speech at the opening of the Legislature, appears this paragraph:

"Estimates for the Public Services will be laid before you at an early date. In view of existing conditions they have been prepared to meet indispensable requirements. I invite your consideration of them."

The conditions referred to can be appreciated by a study of the facts we set forth on Monday, based on the Government balances in the Bank of Montreal on March 31st. The last fiscal year closed with an Exchequer deficit of over Three Hundred Thousand Dollars. Nine months of current expenditure, with an allowance of \$280,000 for interest accruing in the Public Debt, has exceeded the current revenue by some \$310,000. If this deficiency continues at the same rate until June 30th next, the deficiency on the running of the year will be well over a Million Dollars.

Since March 31st, some Three Hundred Thousand of the Nest Egg of Half a Million has been used to wipe out the deficit of June 30th of last year. Even if the balance of the year is reduced to zero, the deficit of June 30th next must be over Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars.

The two features of the "existing conditions" mentioned in the Governor's Speech are as follows:

1. An anticipated deficit of \$300,000 on June 30th next, after the half million nest egg is eaten up.
2. The experience of the current year, July 1st, 1914 to June 30th of current expenditure exceeding current revenue by a Million Dollars.

The anticipated deficit is embarrassing. The experience of the year should be enlightening, and the words of the Governor's Speech gave rise to some expectation that a lesson had been learnt, and that curtailments on a large scale would be proposed. That hope was dispelled by the tabling of the Estimates, for the Estimates tabling are actually larger than those of last year. In other words the increases in the estimates exceed the curtailments, and as the Auditor General sets forth, every year that these estimates are always short of actual expenditure, and the curtailments proposed will give rise to the usual crop of unauthorized expenditure by the Governor in Council. The failure of the increased tariffs to respond to the hopes held out by the Finance Minister, is in substance ignored in these estimates. The deficit of last year is ignored. The anticipated deficit of this year is ignored. The eating up of the Nest Egg is ignored. The fact that there will be no nest egg to aid the rising out spending next year is ignored. The order is full steam ahead. To Hades with the consequences.

Last evening the Hon. John B. Ayre passed to his eternal home. For a week or so it was known that this highly respected business man and devoted church worker was nearing the end, and a cable was sent to two of his daughters, Mrs. George Knowling and Miss Emma Ayre, who were absent from Newfoundland, to come home, in the hope that they might see their father before he passed away. Unfortunately this hope was denied them, as before they arrived on the Stephano, their father had died.

The late Mr. Ayre had been ailing for some years and some four years ago he retired from active business life. He was the eldest son of the late Hon. Charles R. Ayre, who died in 1889. He was born on June 18th, 1850, and entered upon his business career at an early age, and has had much to do in developing and building up the great departmental stores of Messrs. Ayre & Sons, Ltd., whose extensive premises occupy conspicuous places on the south side of Water Street. He was returned to the House of Assembly for the District of Bay de Verde, remaining in the House until the general election of 1897. Next year he was appointed to the Legislative Council and remained a member of that Chamber until his death. The late Mr. Ayre was a devoted member of the Methodist Church and a generous supporter of the institutions of that church, but he did not limit his benefactions to these institutions, but was ever ready to extend a helping hand to all deserving causes. He took a keen interest in music and was an authority on everything connected with church organs. When George Street Church was opened, 42 years ago, he became organist, and presided at the organ there until four years ago, when failing health compelled him to retire from this work also.
