Cominion War Loans.



Early in the year when the Government at home found their hands full in financing the war for themselves and their

weaker allies and in advancing loans to the Dominions, the Colonia. Office der indirect war aid to the Empire if they left London and the homeland as a preserve to meet the immense borrowings which the War imposed on the home government. The Common-wealth of Australia took the lead in raising a large sum within her own jurisdiction. Some months ago the Commonwealth Government determined to raise a hundred million dollars locally at 4½ per cent. Twenty-five millions was issued as a first instalment, and this was subscribed for more than two and a half times over. So assured is the Government of floating the whole of the \$100,000,000 that it is said a second loan for one hundred and twenty-five millions will be dred and twenty-five n proposed. The wealth of Australia is considerable. Its five million people at the end of last year had 425 million dollars on deposit in the State Savings Banks, and the assets of the various Australian cheque-paying banks, including the Commonwealth Bank of Australia, amounted to over 900 million dollars. The Labor Gov-ernment's of the Commonwealth have taken a clear lead among the Dominions in organizing an army, a fleet and

in local financing.

Turning now to the Dominion of Canada, we find that she has also been very successful in her financial opera-tions. She raised her first war loan in New York. This was for 25 million dollars. She is paying Five per cent interest on it. She is now engaged in raising a loan locally and in this effort she has met with magnificent success. Her issue was Fifty million dollars, and this was almost all taken up by big subscribers. Her banks took 920,000. Her rich men \$2,500,000 and her trust and loan companies \$1,250, friend 000. The banks, of which there are branches in Newfoundland, subscribed advt. as follows:-Bank of Montreal, \$3,-654,000; Bank of Commerce, \$3,400,-000; Royal Bank, \$2,650,000; Bank of the Insurance Companies subscribers, taking \$1,500,000 each. Toronto took the lead among the Canadian cities by subscribing \$1,000,000, followed by Ottawa and Winnipeg, which subscribed half a million each. Among the inous times. tional Nickel, Imperial Oil Co., and the Commercial Cable Company. As the subscriptions offered were almost double of what was asked, the issue has been increased to \$100,000,000.
