The Council are now repairing that place and in doing so, they re showing a short sightedness that remarkable even for that augus dy. The road could be easily be made four feet wider from Simm's fence to the bridge, by enlarging the mbankment. They are actually lumping sufficient material, by the wer side, a score of yards away, that vould make a side walk four feet wide near the bridge. This material will be largely swept down the river, he first flood in the fall.
