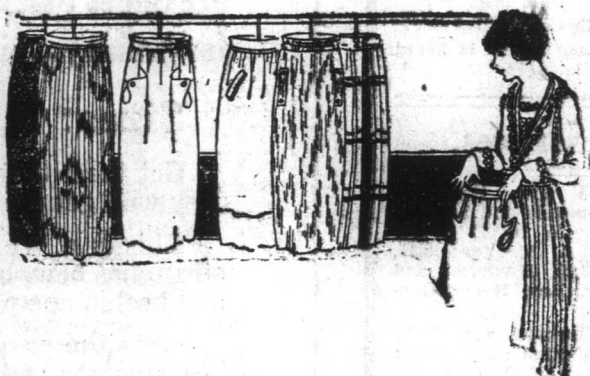

### Hr. Grace Notes.

Again your correspondent has, though not necessarily, to record a regrettable occurrence on the part of some person or persons. One day last week, while Mr. Mark Moore who is, and has been for some two years past, "squatting" near the Northern side of the Maiden Ponds, was out to town procuring his supply of food or on some other business, some person or persons entered his abode and stole a watch from the old gentleman. It is indeed a great pity that the guilty cannot be run to earth and punished severely, for a more dastardly act could not be performed by a heathen, much less a person who is among civilized people. Though not much in itself, the watch may have been a thing which was valued highly by Mr. Moore, and in a possession that is classed among his household necessities. Notwithstanding the fact that the person who stole it is as yet unknown, it may be an easy matter for the police to trace the criminal; and it would be a step in the right direction if the sneak thief would put it back in the place from which he took it, and under the same conditions if necessary.

Wednesday evening as the little wind that was blowing throughout the day, died out and comparative calm reigned, the smoke from the fire to the westward of this town settled down in dense volumes, and for an hour or so the South Side was obliterated altogether — in fact the smoke was so dense that the hills to the back of the town were invisible. A lady passenger from the city Tuesday, states that all along the line from Brigus Junction to Bay Roberts the country is one mass of flame, and at some points the train had to put on speed to get safely past fires which were burning near the railway track. Immediately westward of Hr. Grace, during the early week, huge volumes of smoke could be seen rising up into the air during the day time. Tuesday night some parties state that from Hr. Grace Hill (formerly known as Mosquito Hill), they saw huge tongues of flame leaping skywards. The hills from where the fire is burning right down to Riverhead being densely wooded in places, it is feared that the flames will come near the residents there, should no rain be had within the next few days. The forest fires which have been raging in that direction for some few days past, and which were given little or no concern by our townspeople, are now assuming alarming aspects. It is reported that the great fire to the northwest of the town which had been in progress for some time, has spent itself, and all danger from that quarter is past. There seems to be a little disregard on the part of the authorities in this matter. For instance, one day last week, three or four young boys were watched by certain parties setting fire to a bush near Rocky Pond, and starting a fire which covered some little distance, being extinguished only by the road, where it ended. Nothing was done about it, though the thing was a town topic. Carelessness started the great fires now underway, and nothing but the intervention of providence will end them.

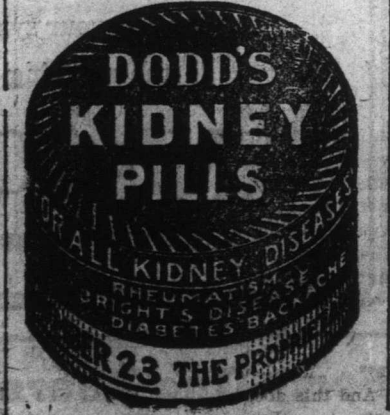

### Widen the Road.

Editor Evening Telegram.  
Dear Sir,—When 'tis muddy in St. John's all our roads are pretty filthy, but the filthiest place in the whole city, is undoubtedly near the King's Bridge. The Council are now repairing that place and in doing so, they are showing a short sightedness that is remarkable even for that august body. The road could be easily be made four feet wider from Simm's fence to the bridge, by enlarging the embankment. They are actually dumping sufficient material, by the river side, a score of yards away, that would make a side walk four feet wide near the bridge. This material will be largely swept down the river, the first flood in the fall. If it were dumped on the western side of the road between Simm's and the bridge, the present rails could be moved four feet back. The embankment will need no piling, any more than does the present one. The Council are actually looking for a place to dump this material, and are wasting it a

few yards away from a spot where its use would make a very necessary and permanent improvement. It looks now as if no one took the least interest in it. The neglect to use this material right at hand to improve this bit of road, looks like studied indifference or stupidity.

I'd like to draw the attention of Councillors Mullaly and Vinnicombe to that because the citizens will



blame them. They should insist that the material being dumped all round the bridge should be used for this purpose. As to the necessity of widening the road at that point, no citizen of even the most limited intelligence need be reminded, that the place in question is frequented by more people in cars, cabs, carriages, motors, and on foot, than any other place in the city. If the opportunity is lost now it will be the greatest example ever, of "How not to do it." As for the extra cost, it would be nothing in comparison with the improvement effected.

I would ask the East End citizens—especially those who pass the bridge several times daily—to watch and see for themselves, how far neglect and indifference can go, when it is nobody's business to see how the money is spent.
