A Call to Arms.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir:—The letter of Fisherman Bay de Verde, in Monday's issue of your widely read paper, struck the right note when he said, the hour has struck for the people to arise in their might and hurl the present hungry sharks from office. The terrible depression existing over this Dominion is attributable to a great extent to the Fishery Regulations, and want, hunger and distress is already felt in many homes not only in this city, but in the outports as well.

The shutting out of the American buyers from purchasing fish when orders were placed with St. John's brokers, would have given many fishermen a price for their fish, and would have kept them in independence all over the country. Men like P. J. Shea and other brokers in this city were not permitted to purchase and fill orders for the New York brokers, because the uncrowned King of this unfortunate Dominion would not allow them to do so.

Is it any wonder then that small merchants in the outports are ruined? Is it any wonder that fishing property in the outports that has been in families for generations is offered for sale at one quarter value? Is it any wonder that business men in outports will no longer risk their savings in supplying for the fishery under the same conditions as existed last season? Are the people going to be led like lambs to the slaughter, while those whom they elected can revel in luxury and ease out of the money wrung from an overtaxed people? No wonder the cry goes up give us a man to lead us out of bondage. The darkness of despair is overshadowing our Island Home and gloom and misery seem to be the people's portion.

To whom shall the people look for assistance? The present government is detested by the great majority of the electorate, who have been deceived into voting against their best interests when they elected to power the greatest conglomeration of usurpers that ever misgoverned this country since Cabot discovered it. Men of Harbor Main, you will shortly be called upon to vote for or against the present government, and we are certain that you in common with the rest of the country will show your detestation of your present rulers, and snuff their candidates under with the largest majorities ever recorded in your district.

If St. John's West and Bay de Verde had the chance to vote now, there is no doubt but that the Government candidates would not even save their nomination fee, and it is doubtful if the Government candidates would be allowed a hearing in those districts. Squires and Coasters are to-day despised by the people whom they deceived, and who are waiting with impatience for something to turn up which will again give them a chance of restoring men who have the interests of the country at heart to power. We are standing on the brink of financial and commercial disaster and the yawning abyss below is in sight, which means the loss of our autonomy.
