

Hold-Up

SEGE TWO OF SUSPECTS HAVE
FURNISHED POLICE WITH
FACTS—RESUME INQUEST.

After Adjournment Of Inquiry May
Be Requested By Police.

One week ago to-day, the collection
of the Bank of Montreal was
suddenly held up under the Mor-
rison Street subway on Ontario Street,
at its junction with the bank messenger
and one of the gangsters
as the result of a gun battle for
possession of a quarter of a million
dollars which left Montreal speech-
less with amazement and indignation.
The robbers got away with \$142,253.
The coroner opened and adjourned
the inquiry on Wednesday last. The
body of the victim, the recovery
of the loot and of the criminals.
The two women are held at
the Headquarters and will ap-
pear at the resumption of the coroner's
inquest to-morrow morning. The
case may be further adjourned at
the request of the police.

A man and a woman among the
suspects are stated to have broken
under the strain of the evidence
presented by the police, connecting
them with the hold-up, and through
important facts are said to have
been into the possession of the po-

lition. Egan refuses absolutely
to discuss the crime or any of its as-
pects.

The hold-up record of some of the
suspects is not confined to Montreal
but extends as far as Detroit, and
Boston, Mass.

During the last two or three days
police have been given informa-
tion which has sent them on wild
chases for the recovery of \$50.
The last of these clues took De-
puty Sergeant Pigeon to St. Ar-
thur, Bagot County, whence he re-
turned this morning, but declined to
make any statement as to the success
of his mission.

During this morning, Lyon W.
K.C., who is representing two
of the suspects, stated that he knew
when the coroner's Court reas-
sembled the police would throw
up suspicions on several of those
named. He was positive, however,
that the two he was representing
would be able to clear themselves of
connection with the hold-up last Tues-
day. He added that he had been re-
spected as counsel to a number of
lawyers interested in the de-
fence of the men and women in cus-

ody of the robbery itself, Mr.
K.C. stated that while he deeply re-
gretted the circumstances surround-
ing the case, he was sure that none of his
clients had been implicated. He de-
clined to discuss the case in regard
to other respects.
