No Central Bureau to Control Traffic in Arms

Premier Baldwin Declines to Set a Time Limit on Debtor Nations--Germany Intends to Carry Out Dawes Plan--Proposed Changes in B.N.A. Act Will Not be Considered this Session.

GERMANY WILL CARRY OUT DAWES PLAN.

BERLIN, May 18. Foreign Minister Stresemann announced to-day to the Reichstag that the German Government will continue to carry out the Dawes plan.

4 DEAD IN MINE EXPLOSION.

DORSTFELD, Germany, May 18. The number of known dead in the mine explosion here Saturday has now reached 47 with 27 injured.

DECLINES TO IMPOSE TIME LIMIT.

LONDON, May 18. Replying to a suggestion to-day in the House of Commons, Premier Stanley Baldwin declined to impose a time limit on France and other debtor countries in which to formulate proposals for the settlement of their debts to Great Britain.

NO CENTRAL BUREAU FOR ARMS CONTROL.

GENEVA, May 18. The crisis in the international conference for the control of the traffic in arms and munitions which has been created by the refusal of the United States to have the League of Nations Council appoint a control office for arms control was averted to-day by the decision to abandon the plan to establish the proposed central bureau.

SHEPHERD ON TRIAL FOR MURDER.

CHICAGO, May 18. Caught in the trail of disaster that has followed the McClintock fortune for generations, William D. Shepherd, the last titular owner, to-day faced trial for murder. He stood charged with slaying by typhoid germs, the last possessor of the \$1,500,000 legacy, William Nelson McCormack, a youth, who, as a ward of Mrs. Shepherd, had lived with them 16 years. Shepherd counter-charged that it was a plot fostered by a dozen cousins of McClintock to break the will in order to come in for a division of the fortune.

HALIFAX, May 18. The Danish steamer Hans Amensen, which stranded near Whitehead, Guysborough County, Friday evening, May 8, while on a voyage in ballast from New York to Montreal, was reloaded this afternoon by the Halifax wrecking tug Reindeer. It will be towed to Halifax for permanent repairs.

West Coast Fishery

The following reports have been received by the Secretary of the Board of Trade during the week:

Hare Bay, Cul de Sac to Francois, District of Burgeo and La Poudre--Total landed to date 4,300 qtls., for the previous week 400 qtls. There are no traps in the water, but 50 dories and skiffs and eight boats are operating. No bankers have arrived. Herring for bait purposes plentiful. Five boats have arrived from the western shore averaging 40 qtls. per boat.

Eagle Pt., Long Harbor Pt. to Mall Bay--Total landed to date 20 qtls. No traps in water. Dories and skiffs fishing 15. Prospects very poor with cod nets at present. Herring plentiful. Nothing doing with trawls yet.

West Point to Otter's Point--Total landed to date 360 qtls., for past week 180 qtls. No traps in water. There are 26 dories and skiffs fishing. Prospects are very good, though herring bait is scarce.

Belleoram to Rencontre East--Total landed to date 2,900 qtls. Three bankers have arrived, including the S.S. Cape Agathas, which is being reported as a banker. The shore fishery is poor, though bait is plentiful.

Richard's Harbour West to Raymond's Point East--Total landed to date 4,075 qtls., with 250 for the week. There are 220 dories and skiffs operating. Prospects are poor, but there is sufficient herring for bait purposes. The weather has been exceptionally moderate for the past week, only a part of one day were the men prevented from fishing. A very poor catch, however, has been made, there being not over 30 or 40 qtls. per boat taken, whilst in some cases not half this amount was secured.

Great Harbour, Connaigre Bay to Coomb's Cove, Bay de l'Eau--Total catch landed to date 1,755 qtls., with 605 for the week. 35 dories and skiffs were responsible for 105 qtls. One banker has landed 500 qtls. Prospects are good; herring plentiful. Fishing was not so good as during the previous week, the weather being foggy.

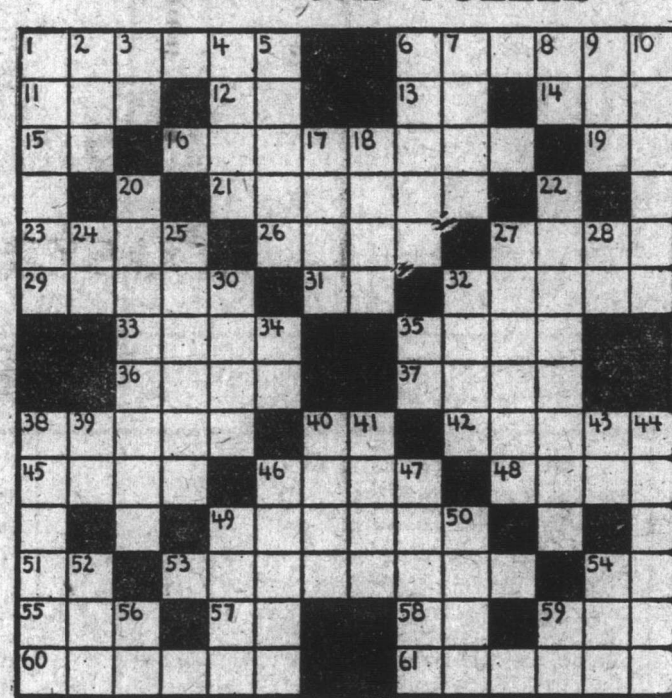
Shipping
