Playgrounds For the Children

At the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday Mr. Cyril Cahill, M.H.A., delivered an address on Playgrounds for the Children, a matter which Rotarians in particular and our citizens generally took a keen interest last summer. The address, a synopsis of which appears in this issue, is timely, summer, or at least the time for summer, has come round again, and the immense amount of pleasure and benefit derived by the youngsters last season by means of the organized games in the parks makes the necessity for similar arrangements now greater than ever. The failure to provide recreation for the children in the past was an unintentional oversight, but to deprive them of what they have been taught to enjoy would be nothing less than a cruelty.

The Rotarians who were mainly responsible in organizing the movement in St. John's are willing and anxious to do everything within their power to encourage the movement, but they are only a small section of the community, and generous as they are and have been with their time and money in promoting the welfare of the city children, it devolves upon all of us to second their efforts with right good will, in order to let them see that what they have done is appreciated, and in order, too, that we may have the gratification of feeling that we have performed a civic duty and a kindly act at the same time. Our return will be good value for the money however much we contribute. To Dr. Burke and his committee, whose devotion to this work last year resulted in making it successful, great credit is due, and it is gratifying to know that they are again exerting every effort to extend the movement.

St. John's unfortunately has been built up with scant consideration for the requirements of its young citizens, but in that respect it is not alone. Montreal, for example, has discovered how serious an oversight it was to allow the city to grow without making adequate provision for open spaces where the children might enjoy health giving recreation, and it has been suggested that certain streets should be given over to them for that purpose. It is fully realized that the youngsters must play, and not only in their interest, but for the comfort and convenience of the public, they should be given every encouragement to indulge in their pastimes in places where they are out of harm's way, where the air is pure, and where they have sufficient space to let themselves go to their heart's content.

The Municipal Council has shown itself fully alive to the needs of the children, and its decision to utilize the parks as playgrounds solved in a great measure the difficulty of accommodation. The apparatus erected was immensely popular, and the work of Mr. Barton and his aides in organizing games was an unqualified success. Mr. Barton, we understand, will again act as supervisor this year.

The response to the appeal

when the movement was inaugurated was prompt and generous, and so carefully were the funds administered that there is a balance on hand to enable the Association to begin making arrangements for this summer. It is not sufficient, however, to cover the cost of additional apparatus and supervision, but in such a worthy cause we feel certain that the Association may confidently rely upon the public to express its appreciation in a tangible form.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES

MOROCCAN COAST BLOCKADED.

PARIS, June 19. The blockade of the Moroccan coast by French and Spanish warships to prevent arms and munitions reaching Abd-el-Krim, leader of the warring Moroccan tribesmen, became effective at 5 a.m. The French and Spanish Governments reached an agreement last night regarding the details.

FOREIGN POWERS' SUGGESTION.

PEKING, June 19. The foreign powers to-day suggested to the Chinese Government the undertaking of negotiations to settle both questions arising from recent disturbances in Shanghai, and also to discuss the broad aspect of the conditions in China generally.

PRINCE'S ADDRESS DROWNED BY CHATTER OF ZULU.

PETERSBURG, S.A., June 19. When the Prince of Wales reviewed an assembly of natives yesterday, he tried to deliver an address but the words were drowned by the chatter of Zulu women. Native policemen raced around waving knobbies and threatening to pummel the women, but they would not be silenced.

AGITATORS DEMAND WAR ON BRITAIN AND JAPAN.

SHANGHAI, June 19. Despatches to the Exchange Telegraph Co., says fifty thousand persons attended an anti-foreign demonstration there, demanding war against Great Britain and Japan. Many foreign refugees from the interior are flocking into Shanghai.

CONFERENCE COLLAPSES IN CHINA.

SHANGHAI, June 19. The Conference between representatives of the Foreign Diplomatic Corps of Peking and the Chinese with the object of bringing about a settlement of the disturbed conditions, has collapsed and the Allied Commission has left for Peking.

SUCCESS OF WEMBLEY DOUBTFUL.

LONDON, June 19. The success of the experiment of keeping Wembley Exhibition open for the second year is trembling in the balance. It is generally admitted that the show is better than last year, but so far the average attendance is not half of last year's record and the management is getting seriously concerned.

SAFE AFTER UNTOLD HARDSHIPS.

LONDON, June 19. Aboard Amundsen has once more come safely out of the merciless grip of the Arctic. The abandoned sea-plane, frozen in ice some one hundred and fifty miles from the North Pole, remains as his farthest north-marker, but the great Norwegian explorer and his five intrepid companions are enjoying the comfort of bunks and warm meals after 28 days of untold hardships, during which they tried the other machine out of the ice and flew it back to Spitzbergen. Amundsen failed to realize his dream of reaching the Pole by air, but the failure is almost entirely lost sight of here in the great popular wave of relief at the news of his return and admiration at his heroic accomplishment. Amundsen's two planes, one commanded by himself and the other by his fellow adventurer and financier, Lincoln Ellsworth, disappeared over the northern horizon from King's Bay, Spitzbergen. The planes carried no wireless and as the days passed without the flyers return, hopes began to fade that even Amundsen with all his Arctic lore could survive in event of an accident to the machines.
