AND YET ANOTHER DOUBTING THOMAS.

Editor Tvening Telegram Dear Sir .- As an experienced Walonian, I have read with interest your report of the large catch (50 trout) in Fortune Bay, weighing 466 lbs., or over 9 lbs. per trout, in exactly four ours, as per Mr. Warren's letter published in the Evening Telegram of September 14th.

Like Mr. Tucker I must say I doubt ry much the veracity of this "Fish tory," but as neither Mr. Tucker nor have seen the size of the boat or the trout, I will attack the story on a different course, and that course is the time in landing the trout, which stands no argument.

I may say I have landed 25 trout veighing in all 125 lbs., and at another me 8 trout weighing 62 lbs., also a 71/2 lb. trout which took me thirtyfive minutes to land. The trout referred to in your letter average over nine ounds each, and I defy anyone to and a trout of this size in less than een minutes, and this is the minium time for this size of fish, caught airly on a rod as per letter, and not even allowing for the loss of time in taking the fish from the hook or waitng for another rise, the best that ould be done would be to land the lot 121/2 hours or fifteen minutes per ive minutes per trout, and this calculation does not even include the time catching the ten trout that were not weighed.
