ANNUAL THANKSGIVING SERVICES.

Yesterday was observed as the Thanksgiving Day for the members of God vouchsafed through the year, and by invitation Rev. George B. Pickering of Harbour Grace, preached on both occasions. The text for the morning was Job 35-10, "Where is God my Maker who giveth songs in the night?" Job's three friends argued that he must have sinned or God would not have allowed such trouble to come upon them. Elihu's opinion was that God allowed trouble in order to discipline his saints, and when in their distress they cry unto Him, the sin of a man does effect God by becoming a matter of compassionate interest to Him, and in the time of sore affliction He will demonstrate His power, to lift them above it, and give them an opportunity to acknowledge Him. This has been the experience of many of God's people when they submitted themselves unto Him, and He has truly comforted them by giving them "songs in the night." The night of the betrayal, Judas went out, but after the address of Jesus to His disciples, they sang a hymn as He went out to the night of suffering. Paul and Silas sang praise to God that night in the prison. John Bunyan had his visions in Bedford jail and his songs have cheered the pilgrim Christian on his journey through the valley for many years. Wesley when dying tried to sing, "I praise my Maker while I've breath, and when my voice is lost in death, Praise shall employ my nobler powers," and the saintly Fletcher said to those standing around his bedside "God is Love." Madame Guyon sang in her cell, and in this division of his subject a very pathetic incident in connection with the preacher's ministry was told which touched many hearts. Yes, God alone can give us these "songs in the night." If we wait on Him; He will teach us the music, and they will comfort the singer and have an effect on those who listen. Dr. Stalker who lost his wife and child after having been married but a little over a year, always prayed as if they were with him close beside. Passersby heard him, and if we live like that, it will recommend our religion. It was most edifying and comforting discourse, and on reflection his hearers felt that even in adversity, and sorrow and bereavement there is cause for thanksgiving.

In the evening Mr. Pickering's subject was "Individual Thanksgiving," based on Jacob's words, Genesis 32-10 "I am not worthy of the least of all thy mercies, and of all the truth which thou hast showed unto thy servant, for with my staff I passed over Jordan, and now I am become two bands." He remarked that in the study of Jacob's character there was much to learn. Some things are worthy of commendation, others we must wholeheartedly condemn. The speaker then reviewed some of the characteristics which marked Jacob's career. His shrewdness and deceit, at first, but his humility and gratefulness, later. The leaving home in disgrace with nothing but a staff, and the contrast of returning over Jordan a very wealthy man, truly, with flocks of sheep, herds of cattle, and many servants in a material sense, but what satisfaction did his prosperity give him? He was in great mental trouble, his crookedness, his cheating his brother put a chill of fear through him. Esau was coming to meet him with four hundred men, and could easily destroy him and take all his property, and he prayed to God for deliverance, but it took him all night to see his sin as God saw it, and as Esau knew it. But after his struggle, he broke down, acknowledged his guiltiness and God's providence, and entered into his spiritual inheritance. He went to meet his brother with the spirit of confession and restitution, and was received with reconciliation and forgiveness. As we count our many blessings we have much to thank God for. Good homes, praying mothers whose holy influence will never leave us, and God's goodness in health, etc., all through the past, should lead us to thankfulness and consecration. The officials and congregation speak of Mr. Pickering's efforts as being very acceptable, and are greatly obliged to Miss Helen Oates, A.T.C.M., for coming at short notice and presiding so efficiently at the Organ in the absence of Mr. Pratt who became unwell in the afternoon.

Hunters Secure Rocky Mountain Goats for Museum

Vancouver, B.C.—The Field Museum of Chicago, which has sponsored the quest of Keen and Theodore Roosevelt for the rare ovine population in the mountains of Turkestan, will shortly exhibit one of the finest and most complete groups of Rocky Mountain goats on the continent as a result of the successful expedition into the Kootenay country of Central British Columbia.

J. Friesser, successor to Carl Akeley, world-famous big game hunter, as chief taxidermist of the Field Museum, was the leader of the hunt for the Rocky Mountain goats, and with him were Holling C. Holling, assistant taxidermist, and James W. French, of Vancouver, a big game hunter.

In addition to the goats, fine specimens of elk and mule deer were secured. The expedition outfitted at Skookumchuck, on the Kootenay Central Railway, and left early in October for the big game country around White River, Elk Creek and White Swan Lake.

Scores of goats were stalked and carefully inspected through powerful binoculars in order to get perfect specimens. The party could have shot dozens of average goats if numbers were all that was wanted. Many of these chances were passed up in order to get just the representative specimens needed to round out a well-balanced group for the museum.

One of the laborers loading S.S. Humber Arm fell into the hold and had his head fractured. Report from the hospital this morning is that he is doing well.

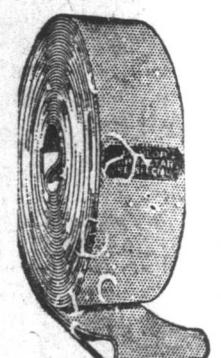
