## ELGIN BAPTISTS HAD INTERESTING SESSION

Many Delegates Attended. Splendid Addresses. New Officers Named.

The annual meeting of the Elgin Baptist Association, comprising the twenty-three Baptist churches in this county of Elgin, was held in Aylmer, June 12-14.

The first day was entirely taken up by the Women's Mission Circle. Encouraging reports were made of what had been accomplished during the year, and inspiring and informing addresses were given by Mrs. D. E. Brown, of Inna Station; Mrs. A. O. Clark, of St. Thomas; Mrs. A. S. Rogers, of Aylmer and Mrs. Geo. M. Fox, of London. Mrs. Clark L. Timpany, a returned missionary, gave an address on "India as I know it," that was very informing.

A missionary exercise by the young ladies' Circle, of Aylmer, was also much enjoyed.

The officers for the ensuing year will be: President, Mrs. A. S. Rogers, Aylmer; vice-president, Mrs. J. D. Poutud, Malahide; sec-treas, Mrs. U. D. Royal, St. Thomas; directress, Mrs. Mary McCandless, Sparta, Ont.; assistant, Miss Margaret Laidlaw, Sparta, Ont.

Much regret was expressed at the retirement of Mrs. J. H. Rinch, of St. Thomas, from the office of directress, after several years of faithful and successful service.

The regular associational meeting was begun Wednesday by a devotion service conducted by Rev. W. E. Walker, of New Sarum, Rev. Wm. Westell, of Sparta, the moderator, president and Rev. A. Smith, of Port Burwell, was appointed clerk pro-tem.

The morning was devoted to hearing of reports and statistics from churches, schools and board of management and the appointing of a nominating committee.

The devotional service at the beginning of the afternoon session was conducted by Rev. T. J. Mitchell, of Aylmer. The two outstanding features of the afternoon were the moderator's address by Rev. W. Westell, and one on "Christian Education" by Dr. A. L. McCrimmon, chancellor of McMaster university. Helpful discussions followed each address.

At the evening service, Rev. J. H. Kelly, of Sheddin, conducted the opening exercises. The annual sermon was preached by Rev. Andrew Smith, of Port Burwell, the theme of which was "God in the Common Things of Life" from Ex. 3:2-7. This was followed by an address on "Present Day Demands on the Christian" by Rev. D. C. Elliott, of St. Thomas.

Rev. J. B. Brown, of Springfield, conducted the opening exercises on Thursday after which the following officers were elected: President, Rev. T. J. Mitchell, Aylmer; Sec-Treas, Rev. W. E. Walker, New Sarum; Board of Management, Revs. Mitchell, Walker, Elliott, Westell and Mr. H. J. Milton, of Dutton.

Representatives of the various denominational interests were also appointed as follows: Home Missions, Rev. T. J. Mitchell; Foreign Missions, Rev. A. Smith; Educational, Mayor R.

H. Wright; Western Mission, Rev. J. B. Brown; Grand Ligne, Rev. J. H. Kelly; Superannuated ministers, Rev. T. Bingham, Dutton; Sunday schools, Mrs. A. O. Clark, St. Thomas; P.Y.P., U. Mr. W. W. Richmond, of St. Thomas.

W. C. Senior, of Toronto, then addressed the meeting on "Denominational Finances" explaining the scheme by which the money needed to carry on the work of the body and asking for the appointing of a committee to co-operate in carrying it out.

Wm. Wintermute followed with a brief presentation of the claims of the "Canadian Baptist" and urged an increase in the number of subscribers. The paper was intended as the medium through which information regarding the work of the denominations should be made known.

Discussion followed these addresses especially that of the financial scheme. The selecting of a committee was referred to the Dominating Committee.

At the afternoon session resolutions dealing with the educational institutions, temperance finances and Sabbath observance were passed; also one expressing sympathy with those who have been bereaved through the war.

"The Minimum Salary" was the theme of a practical address by W. C. Senior, of Toronto which was emphasized the need of increasing the salaries of pastors who were receiving less than \$700 per annum. A number present gave their experience while laboring on small charges and trying to live on low salaries. The endeavor of the Home Mission Board to raise the salaries of all missionaries to the \$700 was heartily endorsed.

Rev. H. H. Bingham, B. A., of London, gave the closing address of the afternoon on "The Greater Evangelism." In this was stressed the need of caring for the converts as well as leading them to accept Christ as their Saviour.

Mr. Grover Beebe, of Aylmer, led an inspiring song service at the evening session. Rev. Thomas Bingham, of Dutton, conducted the devotional service.
