From the Boys.

Victoria West, South Africa.
March 1st, 1900.

We have been three weeks in Africa, and I have only received one paper since I arrived, and only a couple of letters. Have begun to think I am forgotten by all Aylmer. The time spent at Cape Town was a busy time getting our horses over the trip and in moving shape, and then the drill commenced in earnest. I can tell you our time is pretty well occupied. Cape Town is a pretty place. The place we were encamped was called Green Point, but there was nothing to see but sand, and the wind was something terrible. We are furnished with glasses to protect our eyes from sand, but nevertheless we had a good time. Was only down town twice during our stay. Of course you know our success, and I believe you are better supplied with news than we are out here. Half our boys left the Cape a week ago to day for Victoria West, on account of an uprising among the Boers there, and we would have been with them only the transportation was not sufficient, but we came up here on Saturday, and are now some 43 miles north of Cape Town in a very unfriendly country, where there are many Boers. We have not done any nighting yet, but before you get this we will be at it hammer and tongs. We have the Mounted Police of Canada for our escort and protection, and a lot of New Zealand Mounted Rifles; splendid fellows. All the colonials and everybody else here think we are all cowboys and wild fellows, and our word should be law, and it is respected. We got word about a week before we left the Cape that we were going to the front in the morning, and the boys went down town, and made things hum for a time. Our boys are all in the best of spirits with a very few exceptions, and as I look around at the present time, their tents all around me, I can't come to any other conclusion than that it will be bad for any enemy that will attack the Canadian contingent. I am writing this letter outside, sitting on the ground leaning against the wheel of the gun, and for a writing desk the ammunition box. The gun is number six, the one I lead. Will is centre driver. No. 5 and No. 6 are the left section of D Battery; so if anything is said in the papers of that section, consider us in it. I get the Sentinel from Toronto; am getting it pretty regular, and hardly a day passes but some one comes to me for it; gives a host of general news. I see the I. O. F. have had a grand banquet by the paper. Give my best regards to all of them. We are watched here every night, and see signals passing from hill to hill. What we have seen of the country so far is not very favorable, as almost all we have seen is stones and sand; but we have had a lot of grapes and water melons. Now, to day, they are bringing into camp peaches and pears and apples—splendid fruit. I think I never saw the like. The people here live in the towns, and if they want to stay a few days on the farm, they simply camp out. A waggon came to camp yesterday with 18 oxen attached, and it is nothing to see 24 little mules drawing a waggon. I never saw nicer weather; it has not rained since I have been here, and the sunsets are beautiful. We strike camp to morrow and march away, know not whither, but the scouts and sentries are kept around us, and it looks as though we will have something to do before long. When the Boer prisoners were brought down after the surrender of Cronje, and put on one of the ships in the harbor of Cape Town, they would spit at you through the horse caes; they are bitter against the English. We will be going right on to Pretoria, as we win along the way. We have most of us ostrich feathers in our hats, which would make the ladies of Aylmer jealous. I have seen feathers in Canada, but I never saw feathers like we have here. Tell the boys of Aylmer that I will look for a letter from all of them. It cheers a fellow up. I received a letter from Jim Trim, the only letter I have had from Aylmer. That, with a copy of the EXPRESS has furnished me all the news I have had from Aylmer since I left. How gladly the Aylmer EXPRESS was received and read. I need hardly tell you, not only by myself alone, but everybody in the camp. I will not trespass on your time any longer, but wish to be remembered to all my friends of Aylmer.
