—Mr. J. F. Lister, M. P., Sarnia, was in

—Indignation meeting of disfranchised

voters at Albert Hall this evening.

—Just one year ago Saturday night that

the university fire at Toronto took place.

—St. Paul's Church, Kewwood, was con-

secrated by the Bishop of Huron Sunday.

—The Thompson House, Ingersoll, has

been leased by James O'Connor, a former

Londoner.

—Mr. James McDonald, formerly of this

city, has leased the Grand Central Hotel,

St. Marys.

—Mr. B. A. Mitchell continues to im-

prove. He will doubtless soon be able to

resume business.

—The Bradstreet Mercantile Agency re-

ports W. L. Schmidt, drygoods, Berlin, as-

signed to C. B. Armstrong, London.

—The "Gondoliers" plan has been well

taken up. This afternoon and

evening will see big houses at the Grand.

—A Windsor telegram says: Joseph Aber-
