The Seven Imprisoned Cave Explorers Rescued.

Queen Victoria Will Lend Portraits of Windsor Beauties for Exhibition.

A Liberal Elected to Succeed Sir Charles Russell—Chamberlain's Son Gored by a Bull.

Disastrous Explosion.

LONDON, May 7.—An explosion occurred in the cordite works at Waltham Abbey to-day, killing four men and injuring a dozen. The buildings were wrecked.

Sir Charles Russell's Successor.

LONDON, May 7.—An election was held to-day in the south division of Hackney to fill the parliamentary seat left vacant by Sir Charles Russell. Fletcher Moulton (Liberal) was elected by a majority of 192. Joseph Chamberlain's son badly injured.

Emperor William—Fireman.

BERLIN, May 7.—The little village of Galow, near Shandau, was entirely destroyed by fire this morning. The Emperor at the head of the Shandau engineers, was early on the ground and worked hard to save the burning buildings.

France and Newfoundland.

LONDON, May 7.—In the House of Commons to-day, Mr. Sydney Buxton, Under Colonial Secretary, announced that negotiations with France in regard to a treaty regulating the fisheries along the shores of Newfoundland still remained suspended. The inhabitants of Newfoundland, he said, were generally on friendly terms with the French.

Crispi Was Hissed.

MILAN, May 7.—The exhibition of arts, wines and spirits was opened here yesterday by King Humbert, accompanied by Queen Margherita, Prime Minister Crispi and other members of the Cabinet, the Duke of Abruzzo and the Duke of Aosta. Signor Crispi was hissed by a crowd of Socialists who had gathered at a point where the procession passed. This insult caused great indignation among the other people present who drowned the hisses in cheers. Subsequently the Socialists were obliged to retire in consequence of the threatening aspect of the supporters of the Prime Minister.

Hilarity in the House of Commons.

LONDON, 7.—Sir William Harcourt, Chancellor of the Exchequer, moved the second reading of the budget bill in the House of Commons to-day.

John Grant Lawson moved that the bill be rejected. The debate will be continued until Thursday.

James G. Weir asked if it was the intention to remove the grating in front of the ladies' gallery.

Herbert Gladstone said that it was not. Mr. Weir suggested the transfer of the ladies to the peers' gallery, peers were ladies he said. (Laughter.)

Sir Donald Macfarlane proposed that the wishes of the ladies be ascertained by placing in the gallery a book for signatures under the heads "yes" and "no."

Mr. Gladstone said he would be glad to ascertain the opinion of the ladies and then leave the matter to the House to decide. (Cries of "Hear, hear.")

The Windsor Beauties.

LONDON, May 7.—The Queen has consented to lend to the committee of the forthcoming exhibition of fair women, which is to open at the Grafton galleries at an early date, five pictures of the Windsor beauties, by Sir Peter Leys, from Hampton Court palace, and also "La Femme à l'Éventail," by Rembrandt. The Prince of Wales will contribute also toward the collection. From Chatsworth there will be lent the celebrated portraits of Georgiana and Elizabeth, Duchesses of Devonshire, and from Devonshire House a Greuze, and other paintings by other masters. Among the chief owners of pictures who have kindly consented to assist in the loan collection are Lord Hertford, Lord Levegh, Lord de L'Isle, Sir Charles Tennant, Lord Burton, the Duke of Montagu, Lord Carnarvon, Lord Suffolk, Lord Warrington, the Duke of Portland, Alfred Morrison, and Dr. Frobert. The patroness of the exhibition is the Princess of Wales and the invitations to lend pictures and other art treasures connected with the proposed collection are signed by the Duchess of Portland, Lady Granby, and Lady Iveagh, to whose efforts and interest the success which it is sure to attain will in a great measure be due.

The other afternoon papers comment on the situation in a similar strain.

GOLDEN RULE MEASUREMENT

Shows Where the P.P.A. Falls Short—Rev. Mr. Weeks' Criticism Creates a Sensation.

ST. JOHN, N. B., May 7.—Rev. W. W. Weeks, formerly of Brockville, Ont., now pastor of the First Baptist Church here, created a sensation in his sermon yesterday morning by strongly denouncing the Protestant Protective Association. He hoped, if ever it spread to this Province, no Protestant would identify himself with it; that an organization that would not support a man for office simply because he was a Catholic should not be recognized by Protestants who believed in extending to others the same privilege enjoyed by themselves. Such an organization as the P.P.A., he said, grew out of ignorance, and misapprehension of the Bible.

POLITICAL.

Hon. J. M. Gibson Nominated by His Hamilton Constituents—Notes.

HAMILTON, May 7.—The Reformers of West Hamilton met in convention to-night at the Arcade Hall to nominate a candidate for the Legislature. There was a good attendance of delegates, and the nomination was unanimously tendered Hon. J. M. Gibson, the present representative of Hamilton, who has been the whole city's representative for the past fifteen years. Mr. Gibson gave an account of his stewardship, and thanked the convention for the honor they had done him. J. T. Middleton, Reform candidate for East Hamilton, and others addressed the meeting during the evening.

A Toronto evening paper announces the 20th of June as the most likely date of the Ontario general elections.

It is said Mr. E. F. Clarke may yet be a candidate in South Toronto.

Eigin Prohibitionists will consider putting two candidates in the field for the Commons. They will call a convention in the west riding on Sept. 11 at West Lorne, and in the east riding on Sept. 18 at Aylmer.

IMPORTANT LABOR MEETING.

Representatives of Over 85,000 Textile Workers in Conference—Mine Machinery Wrecked by a Mob.

PHILADELPHIA, May 7.—Fifty delegates, representing over 85,000 textile workers in Rhode Island, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Maine, Vermont, Connecticut and Pennsylvania, met in Labor Lyceum Hall to-day in the fourth annual convention of the National Union of Textile Workers of America. The 6,000 members of the union in New York State are not directly represented. The convention is an unusually important one, because it will decide questions bearing upon the formation of an international textile workers' union, amalgamation with the Northern Silk Workers' Union of America (at the request of the latter), which has 6,000 members; the limiting of hours of labor; the adoption of a uniform rate of wages, "upon as high a basis as possible consistent with the true interests of trade"; the delegation of a portion of the power of the National Union to district councils, and the adoption of a rule whereby no two big strikes will take place in the union at the same time. The convention will also take action upon the National Factory Law. President Thorn's annual report showed that the union has grown over 100 per cent during the year.

MINE MACHINERY WRECKED WITH DYNAMITE. BIRMINGHAM, Ala., May 7.—A mob, numbering from 200 to 500, went to Prince's mines, at Horse Creek, last night and blew up the boilers and other mine machinery with dynamite, and fired two shots into the company's storehouses. No one was hurt. The mob then went to the Victoria mines and blew up several freight cars loaded with coal and turned others loose down the mountain, wrecking them. It appears that the miners at Horse Creek refused to join the strike. The strikers have threatened them several times.

Mobile and Ohio locomotive engineers have accepted a cut of 8 per cent.

The car workers at Pullman, Ill., threaten to strike unless the wages of last year are restored.

Unless the wage scale of last year is restored the men in the Pullman car shops may strike.

Late Canadian News.

A Five-Year-Old Girl Drowned at Seaford.

Fatal Accident at East Hamilton—Verdict for \$3,847 Obtained by a Montreal Widow Against the Street Railway Company.

Burglars forced open the safe in Assumption College, Sandwich, Sunday night, but got no money out of it.

Joseph Truskey, who shot and killed Constable Lindsay at Comber, has so far recovered that he can smoke cigars.

The earnings of the Toronto street railway for April, 1894, were \$69,152, of which the city received 8 per cent, or \$5,532.

A Seaford dispatch says: A 5-year-old daughter of John McLean, Tuckersmith, was drowned on Sunday afternoon while attempting to cross a swollen creek on a log. Her body was carried down stream about 150 yards and not found until Monday morning.

Hon. Robert Reid, Minister of Defense, of Victoria, Australia, arrived in Toronto on Monday. Mr. Reid was entertained at luncheon at the Queen's by President Blain, Sir Oliver Mowat being among the guests invited to meet him.

The Sharon poison case was continued all day Monday at Toronto. The defense will endeavor to prove the poisoning story was a conspiracy to frighten the woman Evans into signing back to her husband property that had been put in her name.

The body of Mrs. Birmingham, a widow having four children to support, and living on King William street, Hamilton, was found late on Sunday night in one of the large tanks filled with cattle feed at Stroud & Son's cattle sheds at East Hamilton. It is probable deceased accidentally fell into the tank.

The widow of Joseph Hamelin, pilot, who was killed by being run over by a street car at Montreal last September, has obtained judgment for \$5,347.50 against the railway company on the ground of gross negligence by the employees in charge of the car.

Henry McCready, about 64 years of age, while driving to his home near Watford on Saturday night during the storm got off the road and was thrown from his wagon. He died a few hours after the accident. Deceased leaves a widow and eleven children.

Chairman Thatcher, of the World's Fair executive committee on awards, has reported most favorably on Canada's fishery exhibit at Chicago.

The Redemptorist Fathers have decided to establish a college of theology in Montreal, which will be the first founded by the order in America.

FOOD FOR FLAMES.

The Cameron Hotel at Stayner Wrecked by Fire.

Conflagrations in Brooklyn, Ottawa, Sarnia, and at Other Points.

SARNIA, May 7.—This afternoon about 1 o'clock the residence of Mr. Morrison was badly damaged by fire. Insured in the Western Assurance Company of Toronto.

FOREST, May 7.—This afternoon the frame dwelling-house of Max Jamieson, on Ontario street, was destroyed by fire with nearly all the contents. Loss about \$700, insurance \$650.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., May 7.—The building occupied by Clarence C. Hopkins, a maker of photographic paper, and Knorr & Co., manufacturers of cardboard, was burned to-day. Loss \$50,000.

STAYNER, Ont., May 7.—About 2 o'clock this morning fire was discovered in the Cameron Hotel, a large brick building occupied by John Coleman. The building was gutted. Loss \$3,000; insurance \$2,000.

MILBURN, Mass., May 7.—The Forester hall was burned this morning, and the town hall, and a number of other buildings were slightly damaged. Loss \$30,000. The fire was incendiary.

MENCHE, Ind., May 7.—The W. N. Whitley Reaper and Mower Works, the largest manufacturing establishment in Eastern Indiana, was destroyed by fire yesterday. Loss \$245,000.

Afloat Again.

NEW YORK, May 7.—The French line steamer L'Esperance, which has been ashore at Fort Hamilton since last evening and towed to her dock unharmed.

Laid in the Grave.

INGERSOLL, May 7.—The funeral of John McDermott, the victim of Friday night's occurrence, took place at 8:30 o'clock this morning; service was held in the Church of the Sacred Heart. There was a very large attendance.

A Boy Drowned in a Barrel. TORONTO, May 7.—About 5 p.m. to-day the 3-year-old boy of George Robble, living on Dominion street, was missed by his mother. Fifteen minutes later he was found dead in a barrel of water into which he had fallen.

Poisonous Mushrooms. SUMMIT CRY, Mich., May 7.—Samuel Hulet and family were poisoned by what they supposed to be mushrooms. The eldest boy, aged about 6, is dead, and another child, aged 2, is expected to live. George Hulet, a brother, as well as Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Hulet, are in a critical condition.

Coxey's Army. PORTLAND, Oregon, May 7.—The Portland contingent of the industrial army being unable to proceed to Washington in a body is traveling in small bands. Two bands of 50 men each have boarded Union Pacific freight cars and are traveling eastward.

TACOMA, Wash., May 7.—The Coxeyites put a torpedo on the Northern Pacific track a mile and a half east of Easton last night and stopped an east-bound freight train. More than 100 of them boarded it. The engineer backed the train into Easton and side-tracked it. Deputy marshals were sent from Stampede, eleven miles from Easton, to eject the tramps.

STRUCK THE PRIEST

And Sent the Communion Flying—Prof. Corkery in a Hamilton Cathedral.

HAMILTON, May 8.—Prof. Corkery, the anti-Catholic lecturer and alleged ex-monk, created a sensation in St. Mary's Cathedral here on Sunday morning. He entered the church and knelt at the communion rail with several hundred others.

There was nothing in his appearance to lead anyone to think that he was anything but a devout Catholic worshipper. When, however, Mr. McEvay presented the sacrament the man suddenly arose, threw up his arm, striking the priest with such force as to send the host flying high in the air, over the heads of those waiting and into the aisle, where it fell upon the floor. The fellow accompanied his erratic action with loud angry words:

"You call that the body of the Lord! That's no more the body of Christ than the man in the moon or this woman is!" he shouted, pointing at the lady who had been at his side when he knelt down, and who now shrank away in terror.

Such actions and words occurring at the most solemn moment of the communion service had a wonderful effect upon all present. The silence of the grave reigned. The faces of the women were deathlike and the men seemed as if unable to move a muscle.

But Mr. McEvay never lost his presence of mind, and his coolness seemed to unnerve his assailant. Turning to Mr. Gieseman, who had also gone forward to take the sacrament, and to Mr. James Loftus, who was the second person at the rail from the man, he said:

"Take him out." Mr. Gieseman took him by the arm, and he turned and left. His defiant air had gone, and as he walked down the aisle, escorted by the usher and followed by Mr. Loftus at the other side, he looked like a newly-shorn sheep. He was taken to the door and told to go, which he did, making his way southward on Park street. No one from the church attempted to follow or watch him.

Corkery, when interviewed, said that as his mission to Protestants in Hamilton was his, he resolved to try it on Roman Catholics. A warrant for his arrest has been sworn out by Mr. McEvay, who says he does not want a reputation of the deed. It is the general opinion that Corkery's act was a fool's game to advertise himself. His lectures here have not been very profitable.

JUMPED OFF THE TRAIN.

Fatal Accident to John A. Morrison, of Woodstock, Near Beachville.

WOODSTOCK, Ont., May 8.—John A. Morrison, aged 26, employed in the James Hay furniture factory, while jumping off the 8:45 o'clock accommodation G. T. R. express at Beachville, five miles west of here, met with a fatal accident on Saturday night. He was pitched into a cattle guard, and his body struck one of the cross-sticks, causing a fracture of one of his ribs, which penetrated the bowels. The unfortunate man died at the residence of his father-in-law, Wilson Craig, at 5 o'clock Sunday afternoon. The remains have been brought to Woodstock for interment. Deceased leaves a wife and one small child.

THE U. S. TARIFF COMPROMISE.

An Almost Entirely New Face Put on the Tariff Bill.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—It appears that the number of amendments made in the tariff bill under the compromise exceed those made in the Senate finance committee. The amendments are most numerous on the chemical, iron and steel, agricultural and sugar schedules, but they affect the entire bill, including woolens, cotton goods, metals and many other articles.

In almost every instance increases have been made, and there has been a general slaughtering of the ad valorem for specifics. The sugar schedules totally changed, and iron manufactures show an interesting transformation.

Silver Saved His Life. SAN FRANCISCO, May 8.—Jake Rudolph, a well-known politician, and his body guard, Chris Buckley, the ex-Democratic boss of this city, went to the Chronicle office yesterday for the purpose of shooting Mr. H. Deyoung, its proprietor. J. E. Gieseman, business manager, attempted to eject Rudolph, when he fired a shot from a revolver at him. The bullet struck some silver in Eliot's pocket, saving his life. The would-be assassin was arrested. He says he owed Deyoung some money and would have shot him at sight.

Around the World in Sixty-Six Days. MONTREAL, May 7.—Mr. Griffiths reached here from Vancouver on his way around the world by C. P. R. this morning at 8:37 o'clock. He was met by Mr. H. R. Ibbotson, C. P. R. passenger agent, and Mr. W. H. Clancy, representing Cook & Son. Mr. Griffiths is commissioned by Pearson's Weekly to make a tour of the world in 66 days. He left Charing Cross at 11 a.m., March 12. He reached Paris twenty hours after and Naples on the afternoon of the 14th. He reached Yokohama on April 18. He goes to New York via Delaware and Hudson and may arrive at his original starting point with two days to spare should no unforeseen hitch occur.

CHEMISTRY seems likely to furnish substitutes for the expensive perfumes now made from flowers. It has long been known that the exact odor of the banana is produced in the laboratory. There seems a possibility, however, that even when some fragrant plants cease to be cultivated for the perfumes many may become of importance in surgery. It has been discovered that some such plants are free from the attacks of insects and from fungus growths, and this may be due to the fact that their essential oils have antiseptic properties. The eucalyptus yields an antiseptic, and so do other familiar plants.
