Kingston, May 6.—At the cheese board today 575 boxes of white and 72 boxes of colored were boarded; sales, 105 at 9 15-16c, and 175 at 9 1/2c.

Chesterville, Ont., May 6.—There were 138 cheese boarded here this evening, 110 white and balance colored; 110 white and 35 colored sold at 10c.

Live Stock Markets.

MONTREAL.

Montreal, May 6.—There were about 600 head of butchers' cattle, 1,500 calves, 150 sheep and 40 spring lambs offered for sale at the east end abattoir today. The butchers were out in full force and trade was good, but there was more or less decline in the price of all sorts and kinds of animals, excepting spring lambs and live hogs. Shippers were buying suitable for the export trade, paying from 4c to 4 1/2c per lb for steers; from 3 1/2c to 4c per lb for large fat cows and 3 1/2c to 4c for small butchers' cattle sold to 10c.

Most of the sheep were clipped, and these sold at from 3 1/2c to 4 1/2c per lb; spring lambs sold at from 25 to 34 1/2c.

Fat hogs sold at from 5 1/2c to nearly 6c per lb.

Calves were very plentiful and low-priced for any but good veals; prices ranged from 75c to \$5, common lots selling at from \$2 to \$3 each.

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A Boy's Heroism.

Saves the Lives of Many Men in a Mine.

Stuck to His Post at the Hoisting Engine With a Burning Box Containing Dynamite Only Ten Feet Away.

Houghton, Mich., May 7.—With a box containing 200 pounds of dynamite on fire, ten feet away from him, John Thomas, a boy who runs a compressed air hoisting engine in the Tamarack mine, stuck to his post and saved the lives of the men at work in the mine by his wonderful bravery.

Ten seconds after Thomas had hoisted the men to the level, the dynamite exploded, smashing the engine to pieces and doing other damage, but the men and the boy to whom they owe their lives were in a place of safety.

The miners working in the 23rd level had put seven cases of dynamite in the export trade, paying from 4c to 4 1/2c per lb for steers; from 3 1/2c to 4c per lb for large fat cows and 3 1/2c to 4c for small butchers' cattle sold to 10c.

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
