SERIOUS TROUBLE IN CHINA. Pekin, March 27.-The "boxer" movement in the north is assuming alarming proportions. News has been received here that an indecisive fight has taken place between the "boxers" and imperial troops at Yen Chiu, province of Chili. Each force numbered about 1,500 men, and there were heavy casualties on both sides.

BRITISH WARSHIP SENT TO TAKU Shanghai, March 27.—The British second-class cruiser Hermoine has been ordered to proceed immediately to Taku. The country around Tien Tsin is greatly disturbed, and, according to reports in circulation here, the powers are making arrangements for concerted action. It is reported that a British

missionary has been killed. Berlin, March 27.—Bishop Anzer, of Shan Tung, arrived here yesterday from Rome, where he had reported fully to the pope regarding the Chinese and their prospects. Today he was received by Count Von Buelow and Prince Hohenlohe, to whom he decribed the present situation in Shantung and at Pekin. He predicts a great future for Tsing Tou and the whole of Kiao Chou.

REBELS PUNISHED BY BRITISH FORCE.

Yesterday's Oriental mail contained the news that the British forces under Capt. Harrington, in North Borneo, had finally killed Matt Selleh, the archrebel who had three times incited the natives to rebel against British rule. His followers were dispersed. The British Chartered Company of North Borneo hired Selleh to end his rebellion two years ago, but he started another war when his money was gone.

ADMIRES BRITISH ARMY. Paris, March 27 -Count Adalbert Sternberg, an Austrian officer, who fought under Gen. Cronje, and who was among the prisoners taken at Paardeberg, was interviewed on his arrival here from London regarding his South African experience. He said the European officers in the Boer ranks had as a rule done but little. When asked if continental troops would have fought better than the British, he re-plied: "In the first place, there is no continental power which could have armed and sent so many troops such a great distance from home. I am able to say one thing-even our Austrian would not have done better.

I learned to admire the British army." 20 CENTS A DAY SALARY. Paris, March 27.—Crooks are swarming to Paris for the exposition, the crowds promising a splendid field for all sorts of confidence games. Employers and Machinists Make Terms in Chicago.

5,000 Miners Get a 20 Per Cent Raise

Chicago, March 27 .- Over 100 striking machinists, formerly employed by the Slemens & Halske Company, yesterday returned to work for that corporation, their demands for a nine-hour working day and a minimum scale of wages having been granted. The firm, however, refused to recognize the business agent, otherwise the walking delegate, and negotiations were conducted through a shop com-mittee. The return to work of striking machinists at other shops, under similar conditions, is expected.

Altoona, Pa., March 27.-The Altoona Coal and Coke Company, the Henrietta Coal Mining Company, and the Frugality Coal and Coke Company, all of this city, have notified their miners of a general advance in wages of 20 per cent, to take effect April 1. Five

thousand miners will benefit. Toronto, March 27.—The strike feeling among workingmen in Toronto is growing. One of the largest employers of the building trade, in speaking of the situation, said: "If we can keep free from strikes this spring it will be a very busy summer. however, a general strike should be ordered among the machinists and a few of the building trades it would be a serious state of affairs." Another businessman suggested that in the interest of the community the leaders of both sides should get together and adjust matters. In some instances the increase is over 10 per cent. The company made the advance gratuitously, and it came as an agreeable and thoroughly appreciated surprise to the men.

Charleston, S. C., March 25.-The York cotton mills, of Yorkville, this state, have announced they would on next pay day take 3 per cent of the annual dividend and add it to the wages of the operatives. The wages of some of the employes recently were Increased 33 per cent. These were not included in the present increase. President Ashe says: "We cannot but foresee that there must be an end of the present boom some day, and when we get back to the comparatively flat depression of a few years ago, if we ever do, just as we voluntarily increase wages now, we will be compell-
