2,000 CHINESE WERE SLAIN

Rebels Turned the Villages Into Slaughter Pens.

Rebellion in South China Continues Growing in Ferocity and Size— Startling Conclusions Reached.

Victoria, B. C., Dec. 1.—The rebellion is growing in South China, according to late advices. The villages of Lam To Chukui, Kwang Tung, opposed the rebels and fought for two days, but finally had to retire with a loss of 2,000, the rebels losing 200. The rebels after their victory, fired the villages and massacred women and children. Admiral Ho's forces went after the rebels and, driving them back, burned their villages.

It is reported that Field Marshal Count Von Waldersee, supreme commander of the allies in China, will shortly return home. The chief reason given is that the general was deeply disappointed at the outset by the American attitude.

MUCH TALK BUT LITTLE DONE.
The Shanghai correspondent of the London Morning Post, says: "The Hankow viceroy refuses to stop sending supplies to the court unless the Nankin viceroy will also refuse, and the latter, although he undertakes to send no more arms, says he must continue sending supplies as long as the emperor requires them. In fact, all our remonstrances amount to a miserable farce. We have no courage to do more than to talk."

TINKERING ON TERMS.
A dispatch to the Havas Agency at Paris from Peking says the French minister there, is authorized, if all the ministers are in accord, to sign and hand to the Chinese plenipotentiaries the proposition adopted by the diplomats at the Chinese capital, though they will probably undergo fresh modifications.

FEVER AT WORK.
The mortality among Germans in China from typhoid and climatic diseases generally continues large, despite semi-official denials, consequently volunteers for the China reserves are becoming more and more scarce.

STARTLING CONCLUSIONS.
London, Saturday, Dec. 1—3:30 a.m.—The Spectator, in a striking article dealing with the Chinese crisis, expressed the opinion that the most recent developments at Peking forebode a Chinese victory over the allies. "The quarrel has been brought to the test of force," it says, "and force on the civilized side has proved insufficient. This result is mainly due to the attitude of Russia and the United States. If China escapes with a small indemnity and many promises on paper, as seems not unlikely, since Germany and Great Britain may not be willing to incur the expenditure and risk involved in persisting in their demands for an equivalent to a victory for China, for nothing has occurred which will convince the Chinese that their mighty emperor has been defeated or that Europe can avenge any future massacres."

United States brewers say that if the war tax on beer is continued it will drive them into bankruptcy.

Col. W. P. Sanford, of Alabama, was sworn in as governor of that state while lying on a sick bed in Opelika.

Mr. William Hebbden, a young Englishman, was drowned in Lake Nipissing while skating home from Calender.

Mr. J. D. Moore has been appointed registrar of deeds for Waterloo, and Mr. John Motz sheriff of the same county.

Miss Jeanne Langtry, daughter of the "Jersey Lily," is engaged to marry Arthur Hill, a scion of British nobility, who is eccentric and poor.

A combination of sealers has been effected at Victoria, B. C., to oppose the tactics of Indian spearmen, who have raised their wage demands to an almost prohibitive point.

The militia department has received over 40 applications from Canadians desirous of serving under Baden-Powell in the Transvaal constabulary. The matter has been submitted to the war office.

At Montreal Joseph Leelan, aged 16, when washing windows on the second floor of the Temple building, fell off, and happened to light on Felix Geoffrion, aged 65, of St. Henri, who has just entered the building. Leelan had only a broken ankle, but Geoffrion will probably die.

GUESTS OF HER MAJESTY.

How the Queen Received Her Canadian Soldiers.

Intense Enthusiasm of the Spectators
—The Soldier Boys' Buttons and
Straps Coveted as Souvenirs.

London, Dec. 1.—When the Canadian Regiment reached Windsor yesterday the large crowd that had assembled on Castle Hill gave the men from the premier colony of the empire a rousing reception, cheering them lustily at almost every movement they made.

The Queen inspected the officers in the quadrangle of the castle, and expressed her happiness on seeing them. She regretted the heavy casualties that had occurred in their ranks since the war began. Her majesty said: "I am very glad to see you here today, and to express my warm thanks for the admirable services rendered during the war by the Canadian troops. I wish you a safe and happy return to your homes."

Each officer of the regiment was presented individually to her majesty, who conversed with them for a moment or two.

Pte. B. F. Armstrong, who, before enlisting in B squadron of the Canadian Mounted Rifles, was a captain in the Third Regiment of the Canadian Artillery, was presented to the Queen. He lost one of his legs while fighting in South Africa. Her majesty spoke in a most sympathetic way to the unfortunate fellow, as well as to others in the regiment.

When the time came for the party to return to London an immense throng had gathered and became so demonstrative that they rushed into the ranks, grasped the Canadians by the hands, and caused the parade to become disorganized. Others, more wildly enthusiastic, endeavored to wrench the shoulder straps and regimental letters from the clothing of the men, as mementoes of the occasion. Despite the efforts of the police hundreds dashed through the lines into the station and gave the Canadians a wildly exuberant send-off, the bands playing and the crowds singing "Auld Lang Syne." During the rush to see the Canadians at Windsor station several persons were injured. Col. Otter, Lieut.-Col. Buchan and Capt. Macdonald remained at the castle, by command of the Queen, to dine with her majesty and the royal family this evening.

RETURNED HEROES.

Belleville, Ont., Nov. 30.—Ptes. Large and Cunningham, of the R. C. R., who were invalided to England, arrived today. They were received by Col. Ponton, officers and a detachment of the 25th, and escorted to the drill shed, where speeches of welcome were made.

FIFTEEN DEAD.

San Francisco, Cal., Dec. 1.—In the accident to football spectators Friday the total number of dead is 15. John Brown having died yesterday in the hospital. At the hospitals, where scores of injured are under treatment, it was announced that most of the patients were doing well, but that several more names would be added to the list of dead.

SHOT MEANT FOR A BIRD.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Dec. 1.—While hunting, Cope, aged 17 years, and his cousin, Clarence Moharter, of the same age, both residing in Slocum township, were hunting. Cope shot at a bird and missed it. Moharter, who was a few feet behind, then shot at the contents of the gun lodged in Cope's back. The lad died in great agony.
