# FIRING GUNS TO SAVE VINES

Method of Fighting Hailstorms in Europe.

Experiments Made Lately in the Wine grains of ice-hail, in fact. Country Along the Danube.

It is eight years since the first experiments in protecting vineyards and fields against hall by firing cannon were undertaken on a scientific basis.

In olden times all the church bells were rung before a storm and cannon fired The people believed the noise prevented hail clouds from bursting. Experiments with cannon were made lately in the wine country along the Danube, near Krems, on a new system invented in St. Katharine, Styria, by G. Susching, the engineer of the Carl Greinitz iron works. The cannon were fired in two ways-up into the air to a height varying between 1,500 and 2,000 meters, to prevent the forming of ice in the clouds, and horizontally, when a whirling air ring is formed which prevents frost from
