Entire Business Section of the City Believed to Have Been Wiped Quivey, is taking the star part with lished. The guns and equipment are Out - Scores Crushed to Death in Collapse of Buildings-Loss Estimated at Many Millions.

Dispatches from Jamaica by way of London and New York continue to be vague and contradictory, making it difficult to estimate the extent of the calamity at Kingston. It is evident, however, that the number of dead will run into the thousands, while the property damaged appears to be immense, especially in the business section of the city. There seems little doubt but that Sir John Ferguson, ex-cabinet minister of Great Britain, has perished, as well as a number of prominent Europeans and Americans. Many thousands have been injured, and are being cared for in temporary hospitals and aboard ships in the harbor. The populace has taken to the hills back of the city. Looting has been put down, and every effort is being made to relieve the thousands of homeless and hungry.
