annum, and all appointees must serve a probationary period of three months. At the expiration of this period if they are satisfactory to the department they will receive a salary of \$1,200 per annum. All veterinarians accepted must devote all their time to the meat inspection, and will not be allowed to practice. The examination subjects are histol-

ogy, anatomy, pathology, contagious diseases and meat inspection.


