



HAMILTON POLICEMEN WANT INCREASE IN PAY

Ambitious City Constables Ask for 25 Cents a Day More.

Hamilton, June 22-The police comquestions to deal with at their meeting today. One is the appointment of a deputy chief, and the other the request of the policemen for an increase in pay. They will also have to look over a number of men who are applying for positions on the force, and to consider several resignations. While resignations have been rather common of late, the men say that the commissioners will be deluged with them if their request for an increase in pay of 25 cents a day is not grant-ed. For some time the men have been discontented with their pay, and the discontent is becoming more acute all the time. Said one policeman in

speaking of their pay:
"If it were not for the fact that we work on Sundays and holidays we would not draw as much as the laborers on the street. In all other classes of work men are paid higher than we are, and it is time that we got an increase. The firemen get more than we do. We do not begrudge them what they are getting, but think we should get as much. Hamilton is the only city in Ontario where the firemen get nore pay than the policemen. start at \$675 a year, as third-class men; second-class pay \$802, and after working for six years we receive \$840 as first-class pay. Some of the old men are better fixed, as they get pay on good conduct badges, but men who have joined in the last six years have to take the straight pay. A number of men have quit because they could get better pay elsewhere, and a good many more will quit unless something

The men believe they have the sympathy of the chief in their reuest. The chief has several times informed the commissioners that he is having greater difficulty all the time in securing men, and that owing to the low pay the greater part of the men who do offer themselves are men who cannot take responsible positions

With regard to the appointment of deputy chief it is believed that a local man will get the position. The men are in favor of this, and will resent the importation of a man to fill this vacancy. They contend that if outsiders are brought in to fill the head positions on the force there will be nothing for them to look forward to, and that it will be poor encouragement for them to put their best foot forward. While the commissioners are saying little about the man they have in sight, Detective Bleakley's name has been mentioned.

It will take about \$4,600 or \$4,700 a year to finance the request of the men and they consider that as their de-mand is reasonable it should be
