

The law distinctly stated that the school taxes must not be interfered with. If the law was too drastic it should be changed, but while it existed it should be observed. There were no special circumstances justifying the bills under consideration. The Government would from the present time take the position that when these illegal measures came up, under no circumstances would interference the school taxes be permitted. This pronouncement was greeted with aplause from both sides of the House.
