### JUDGE M'MAHON DIED THIS MORNING

Edwin John Moore Wedded in Former Londoner and One of the Ornaments of Bench in Canada.

REMANDED TILL TUESDAY PRACTICED LAW HERE

Hon, Justice MacMahon, judge of the court of common pleas, formerly of this city, died at his residence, 185 Beverly street, Toronto, this morning at 2 o'clock, after an illness of some months, The end came with great suddenness, and was due to an attack of heart failure.

The late Justice MacMahon was widely known in London. He came here in 1870, when quite a young man, and commenced the practice of law on Talbot street. The firm was known as MacMahon & Gibbons, Sir George Gibbons, then a young man, being junior partner.

Later, the partnership was enlarged, and the firm was known as MacMahon.
