Engaged Transportation to Northwest.

Stawa, April 17.—Immigration from the United States this spring is going to set all records, according to information in the possession of the Canadian immigration department and Canadian railroads.

The Canadian Pacific Railway anticipates an indefinite immigration as to 4,000 United States farmers have engaged transportation for themselves and their effects, which include live stock, farming implements, and furniture.

Two hundred freight trains have already been ordered from the Northern Pacific to the Great Northern roads for the transportation of the stock and cattle of which is estimated to be over 900,000.
