DEMAND VERY BRISK ON LONDON MARKET

Potatoes Were Plentiful But Prices Did Not Come Down.

The market today was largely attended by buyers and sellers, and the demand for the different offerings were very brisk. Butter and egg prices were easier, the prices being, wholesale, 20 and 21 cents per dozen for eggs, and from 20 to 25 cents per pound for butter.

The average price for hay was around \$18, and very few leads exceeded \$18. Oats were in demand at \$1.65 per cwt. Potatoes were very plentiful and the prices were, wholesale \$1.30 to \$1.40, and retail, \$2 to \$2.10.

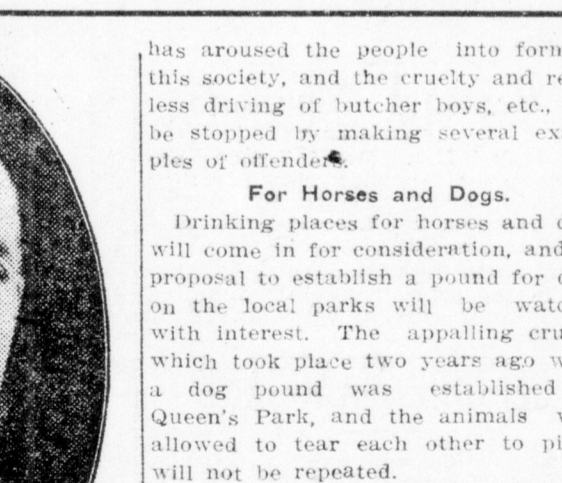
