NEW C. P. R. ISSUE OF STOCK SOON TO BE PUT ON MARKET

Application Likely for Increase in Capital of One Hundred Millions of Dollars—Ottawa Rumor Says That the Rights Will Be Worth Ten Per Cent.

Ottawa, Aug. 14.—The Canadian Pacific Railway is applying to the Government for authority to increase the company's capital stock. It is not officially stated that such an application has been received, but the press has reliable authority for stating that the notice has been received. It can hardly be dealt with finally until the various members of the cabinet now absent from the capital have been reassembled.

The application is being made under the act which gives the company the right to issue new stock when approved by the governor-in-council. The extent of the proposed new issue cannot be ascertained tonight from any official source. There is, however, a well-defined rumor that the new issue will be for \$100,000,000, bringing the capital up from \$200,000,000 to \$300,000,000. It does not appear from this report that all the new stock is to be issued at once.

BOARDS OF TRADE LOOKING OVER MINES

Businessmen on Visit to North Are Being Entertained by Cobalt.

Cobalt, Aug. 14.—This morning the one hundred and thirty members of the Ontario Associated Boards of Trade were welcomed and are now viewing the silver mines of the district. The train was boarded by Mr. A. A. Cole, of the T. and N. O. Railway at Latchford, and the party was tagged with ribbons. Some of the party going to the LaRose and the Nipissing, and the other to the Coning and the Buffalo. At the Nipissing they saw the ore as it was being in the drifts at one end of the town and crossing the latter they watched the various processes by which it was transformed into bullion, each worth from \$5,000 to \$6,000, and each ready for the mint at Ottawa, Washington or London. This afternoon the party will be driven through the clay belt around New Liskard, and tonight they will be entertained by the Hall-iburton board of trade and will hold a business meeting.

DON'T WANT MORRISON

Chinese Officials Object to Him as Political Adviser.

London, August 14.—The Chinese advisers of the Peking Government and the chiefs of the presidential secretariat have protested collectively against the appointment of Dr. George E. Morrison as political adviser of the Chinese Government, according to the Peking correspondent of the Daily Telegraph. The officials argue that the country would not tolerate an alien being entrusted with the political affairs of the nation.

ROYALISTS FOR RIO

Brazilian Metropolis To Be Headquarters for Portuguese Refugees.

Lisbon, Portugal (via the frontier), August 14.—The Portuguese authorities continue to discover fresh monarchist plots against the Government. Thousands of persons have been arrested and the convents and monasteries have been converted into prisons.

It is stated that Brazil has made an offer to the Spanish Government to provide asylum for the Royalist refugees now in Spain, and that the Portuguese monarchists consequently will make Rio Janeiro their headquarters.

The Royalists are reported to be planning another attempt to enter Portugal by sea.

MAY TAKE HYDRO

Work on Stratford Street Railway Has Not Yet Been Started.

Stratford, Aug. 15.—Whether or not the local street railway is begun at once by the Stratford Railway Company backed by the C. N. R., depends upon the acceptance or rejection of a definite proposition made to the light and heat commission this afternoon. The company offers to use hydro-electric power at \$36 per horse-power (24-hour power) for 100 horse-power and \$24 per horse-power for amounts up to 200 horse-power.

Immediate confirmation by the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission will be sought.

CONGRESS AGAIN IGNORES TAFT

Repassed the Steel and Iron Bills Over Veto of the President.

COTTON BILL IN SENATE

Amendment Attached Repealing All but Pulp and Paper Section of Reciprocity.

Washington, Aug. 14.—Repeating the action of yesterday, when it passed the Wood tariff bill over President Taft's veto, the House today repassed the vetoed steel and iron tariff bill within two hours after it had been returned from the White House with the President's veto message. The vote was 173 to 83, a margin of only two votes over the two-thirds necessary to override the President.

The Senate, at almost the same time, was engaged in passing the Democratic cotton tariff bill sent them a week ago by the House. Senator La Follette's substitute, which represented the views of the tariff board was voted down 16 to 14, and the La Follette and eight other Progressive Republicans later joined the Democrats in passing the cotton bill 36 to 19.

An amendment was attached repealing all but the pulp and paper section of the Canadian reciprocity law.

The repassed steel bill was sent immediately to the Senate and responded tonight with the wool bill among the papers technically on the desk of the president of the Senate. Both measures will be called up Friday by Senator Simmons, and the Senate made to repass them, but the Democratic leaders have little hope that they can obtain the necessary two-thirds vote, as did the House.

Insurgent forces in both the House and Senate contributed to the success of the Democratic tariff program. In the House the sixteen insurgents who voted with the Democrats yesterday joined them in over-riding the President's veto, while nine insurgents in the Senate joined in the passage of the Democratic cotton bill.

Democratic Leader Underwood demanded immediate action on the steel bill as soon as the President's veto message was received. There was a chorus of protests from the Republican side. Minority Leader Mann declared that only bills on the calendar could be considered.

Defection of Progressives.
Mr. Underwood retorted with a demand for immediate consideration was a constitutional provision, and could not be denied. The constitutional provision of the House fell upon one another, and a lengthy legal debate ensued. Finally Speaker Clark called a matter of one of constitutional provision and sustained Mr. Underwood. Mr. Mann promptly appealed from the ruling and demanded a roll call. The chair's position was sustained by 241 to 10, and the passage of the steel bill followed.

The defeat of the Republican "Progressives" in the House angered former Speaker Cannon. In the course of an attack on the progress of the wool bill veto performance he spoke of the defeat of yesterday in bitter terms.

Mr. Underwood, however, was not discouraged. He thundered, his clenched fists upraised, "but I am not one of them."
