It is by no means an easy task to come before you this year to speak as president of an organization like the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire. Beneath the shadow of the great events that are going forward in the world, the individual feels so small, and the units of a nation appear so in-

Two principles have guided the individual workers. They have aimed to provide every possible necessity and comfort for the brave men volunteering to serve their country (through the Red Cross for sick and wounded, and field comforts for the fighting men), and they comforts for the fighting men), and they have endeavored to make things better for the wives and children, and all dependents left at home. I do not suppose any chapter has done all that the members would like to have done, but I do believe that this year, in which we have suffered together, the rich and the poor, the socially prominent and the socially obscure has done more to bring the obscure, has done more to bring the different sections of our nation together in mutual sympathy and understanding than any amount of propaganda, politi-cal, social or otherwise, could have done. I feel sure that there is not a Canadian soldier at the front to whom the Daughters of the Empire have not given some little thing to make his life easier, and I hope that there is no soldier's family suffering in the Dominion, if a chapter of the order exists in the community. 
