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

PRINCE TO SEE N. W. GATEWAY, INDIAN EMPIRE

Last Two Months of Tour Will Be Very Busy Time.

MEET WAR VETERANS

Military Pageants Will Be the Main Feature of Northern Tour.

LONDON, Dec. 6.—(By Canadian Press)—The tour of the Prince of Wales in India, in its final phases, in February, and the first half of March, 1922, includes a busy week in Delhi, the seat of the supreme government under the British crown, and from there he will proceed to the premier state of the Punjab, Patiala, in the latter part of February.

On his way to Lahore, which will be reached on February 25, the prince will stop at Jullunder to see the pensioners and ex-soldiers of the districts round that town, and to lay the foundation stone of the Indian military school for the sons of soldiers.

Stopping en route at Sialkot to see the garrison there, his royal highness, on March 2, will reach Jammu, the winter headquarters of the Maharaja of Kashmir and Jammu. From this state went forth many thousands of its subjects to fight for the allies in the war, and the state maintained at full strength on various fronts an admirably efficient force of imperial service troops.

On his way to the northwest frontier the prince will stop at Jhelu, where he will lay the foundation stone of King George's Royal Indian Military School and will inspect a large number of war pensioners belonging to the Western Punjab.

The last fortnight of the visit of the Prince of Wales in India will, in some respects, be the most interesting part of his tour, as it will provide an opportunity for the soldier prince to see the northern army and the conditions under which the work of defending India from external aggression through the frontier passes is carried on.

Arriving at Rawalpindi on March 8, the prince will visit the far-spreading remains of Taxila, famous in the time of Buddha as the great university town of India, and, later, as the headquarters of Alexander the Great. Here the prince will be shown the important excavations carried on by Sir John Marshall, the director-general of the archaeological survey of India.

Then the prince will proceed by motor to the camp of Lord Rawlinson, the commander-in-chief in India, at Hatt, to see the manoeuvres of the Northern Army. On March 9 there will be a cavalry battle at Bushan, on March 10 an infantry battle around Hatt, and on March 11 field firing and artillery displays near the same place.

The word "Kadir" simply means a river-bed. The Meerrut Kadir is about 10 miles long, and through this distance the prince will cover on his tour a bed 20 or 30 feet below the level of the surrounding country, and varying in width from three to eight miles.

LIBERALS LOSE BOTH SEATS IN ELGIN RIDINGS

Stansell Defeats McDermand and McKillop Wins Seat From Tolmie.

BOTH RESULTS SURPRISES

ST. THOMAS, Dec. 6.—Both East and West Elgin elected Conservative candidates on Tuesday. In the east riding J. L. Stansell won over his nearest opponent, S. S. McDermand, by the small plurality of 178 votes, while in West Elgin, which includes the city of St. Thomas, Hugh McKillop of West Lorne, warden of the county, won by a plurality of 237.

The result was a complete surprise in West Elgin, for during the day, in the city of St. Thomas, odds of two to one were asked on A. E. Hookway, Progressive candidate. The city of St. Thomas, however, gave McKillop a plurality over Mr. Hookway of more than 300 votes, and West Lorne, his home town, gave him an excellent vote.

William Tolmie, the Liberal candidate, trailed behind Mr. Hookway by 353 votes. The county gave him splendid support, but not sufficient to overcome the lead his opponents gained in St. Thomas.

Mr. McKillop arrived in town shortly after the results were made known, and was met by a band and scores of flag-waving and cheering supporters, who paraded with him through the city. He made a brief speech at the Conservative headquarters.
