MEIGHEN CAUSES WAR AT BANQUET

Hon. Rodolphe Monty Declares He Was Barred From Quebec.

CAHAN, M.P., DENIES

Says Conservative Leader Kept Away of His Own Volition.

Canadian Press Despatch.
Montreal, Nov. 20.—"Don't you think Mr. Meighen was deceived? You have witnessed the fact that Mr. Patenaude declared against him, saying that he was against his imperialism as much as he was against the Americanization of Mr. King. Under such circumstances Mr. Meighen was unable to come to Quebec. He was forbidden to come. He submitted then but will come now. He will go into Bagot and other parts of the province. It takes a French-Canadian to defend an Englishman."

The foregoing was directed last evening by Hon. Rodolphe Monty, former secretary of state and unsuccessful Conservative candidate in Laurier-Quebec, to C. H. Cahan, K.C., Conservative member-elect for St. Lawrence-St. George, in the course of an interchange at a meeting of the Liberal-Conservative association here. An address by Mr. Monty, wherein he spoke sharply of the situation created in Quebec by which, according to him, the opposition leader had been "prevented from coming here" during the federal campaign, had brought from Mr. Cahan a denial that such was the case.

Doubts Success Anyhow.
"No man ever prevented Mr. Meighen from coming to this province," said Mr. Cahan, "except his own will. When he comes he will receive a welcome from Montreal and other parts of the province. I have my own doubts as to whether he would have got more than 10 per cent of the French vote in the province and it may as well be understood that he was not coming here—and as to the conditions under which the fight was conducted—any assenting party."

In Hon. Monty's address the former secretary of state said that it was time to discuss the political situation as it existed. It was true, that defeat in Quebec was due to Mr. Meighen, nor had the Conservative party been defeated. "What is true is that an independent party has been defeated," said Mr. Monty. "I have nothing to say against the leaders of this party; I do not say that Mr. Meighen and his colleagues would have brought about a better result. Everyone has a share of responsibility."

The Conservative party, continued Mr. Monty, had been losing in Quebec since 1897. Following Mr. Monty, Mr. Cahan addressed the gathering and deflected any one to point to a single word said by Mr. Patenaude that was not Conservative doctrine. He had no personal part in any fight but the committee, but he felt that it did not help the unity of the Conservative party to cast any reflections on those who fought in the last campaign on the Conservative platform.

A verbal interchange between Mr. Cahan and Mr. Monty ensued, in which Mr. Cahan declared that he knew of no deception. "If Mr. Meighen can be deceived in a province which is open to investigation and where he has himself declared that he is a leader of a great party," said Mr. Cahan. "I do not want any argument with Mr. Meighen," he rejoined. Mr. Monty, who is a friend of mine, but I will add this: Mr. Meighen was prevented from coming to this province. He received a warning which in the maritime provinces and he was stopped by it at Lewis."

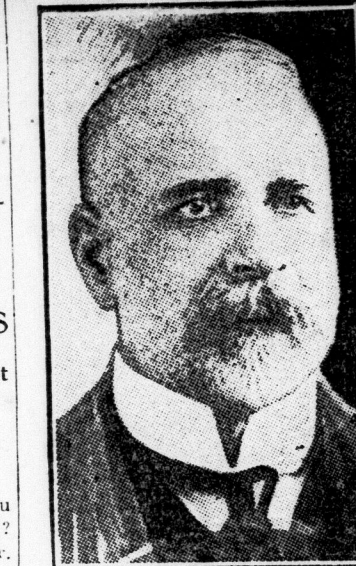

LORAIN IS BARED AS BIG RUM BASE

Ohio Officers Make Hauls of Boats and Whiskey—Planes Were Used.

Cleveland, Nov. 20.—Disclosure that Lorain is a landing base for rum-runners and bootleggers was made today by federal authorities, following the seizure of three rum-running boats, confiscation of 400 cases of beer and whiskey hidden along the beach west of Lorain, and the arrest of an Akron man and a woman.

Warrants for the arrest of four men, said to be ringleaders of the rum-running gang, whose activities center in Cleveland, Lorain, Sandusky, Akron and Pelee Island, are in the hands of federal authorities, it was said.

Five cases of "British Special Beer" were taken from a 40-foot power boat. The boat had apparently been abandoned after most of its cargo had been loaded, either on planes or autos.

Another boat was seized a quarter-mile out in the lake by the Lorain coastguards. This carried no liquor, but the odor of liquor was strong in the hold. The third boat was found tied to the pier at the foot of Georgia avenue in Lorain. It is believed to belong to the "Georgia avenue gang" of bootleggers and runners.

It is believed the liquor was brought over to the Lorain port by small boats and then loaded onto planes for distribution throughout Ohio, Western Pennsylvania and eastern cities. Planes landed and took off in a large field near the place where the beached boat was found, officers said.

WOMAN MUST SERVE TERM ON APPEAL BEING DENIED

Windsor, Nov. 20.—An appeal to the attorney-general of Ontario having failed, Mrs. Mary Osterovitch, 33 Charles street, Ford, Ont., probably will begin serving a sentence in the Essex county jail at Sandwich, Saturday.

Mrs. Osterovitch was convicted of violating the Ontario temperance act three weeks ago and sentenced to one month in jail and fine \$300. If she is unable to pay the fine she will be compelled to spend another three months in jail.

While the appeal was pending, Mrs. Osterovitch was permitted to remain at her home. Members of the provincial police were to take her to jail Thursday, but delayed for a few more days when they learned she had not yet made arrangements for the care of her three young children.

Haley and Lee Carry Off 23 Prizes at Royal Winter Exhibit.

OXFORD MEN SCORE

Cream of Holsteins From Western Ontario—Other Ribbons Many.

Toronto, Nov. 20.—Western Ontario will need several freight cars to carry home all the prizes and ribbons won by stock and horse men from that famous breeding district at the Royal Winter Fair this year.

Not only did the Jersey breeders clean up in their classes, but the two Western Ontario Holstein breeders, Haley & Lee, Springfield, Oxford county and J. W. Innes, Woodstock, carried off the cream of the Holstein prizes.

Haley & Lee won a total of 23 prizes and carried off two champion ships, Belle Calamity Wayne, the champion Holstein cow of America, was acclaimed champion of the Holstein cows, Belle is five years and seven months old, and just about the most valuable cud-chewer at the fair. Her owners have been offered the price of a farm for her. Belle will go back to Springfield and resume her job of giving 112 pounds of milk per day, an unofficial record she has established.

Haley & Lee Winners.
Lady Pouch Susie, junior champion female, is another product of the Haley & Lee farm and gazed at interested spectators with novice contentment during the entire show. Mr. Innes won these second to Haley & Lee in number of prizes won. The City View Stock Farm captured 20 prizes with sixteen animals. This included five firsts, four seconds, three thirds, two fourths, four fifths and a sixth and a seventh.

V. Duchess Toitilla, a splendid animal, was first in junior heifer calves. Mr. Innes also won second and fifth in this class, and was first in get of quality winning the latter with Alcatraz Colantha Ormsby. City View Stock Farm was also first in cows under four years.

BUSINESS WORLD GIVEN OPPORTUNITY

Coolidge Promises To Keep Hands Off—Opposes Public Ownership.

New York, Nov. 20.—President Coolidge last night held out a promise to business that it need fear no interference from his administration so long as it confines itself to legitimate activities.

Addressing 1,000 New York business executives at the 157th annual banquet of the state chamber of commerce, he emphasized the desirability of the "largest possible independence between government and business," declared that business should be unhindered and free, admitted that "proper regulation and control" of business as "disagreeable and expensive," and expressed the belief that, judged by its conduct during the last few years, business can be trusted to keep its own house in order.

"When government enters the field of business with its great resources it has a tendency to extravagance and inefficiency," he said, "and the power to crush all competitors, likewise closes the door of opportunity and results in monopoly."

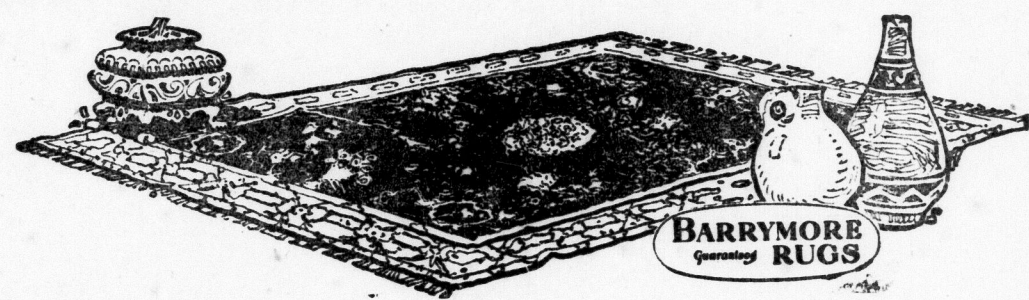

FLOWERS ARE URGED TO BEAUTIFY HOMES

George Simpson, Ottawa, Gives Illustrated Lecture To Kiwanians.

"City Garden Plots and Flower Beds" was the subject of an illustrated address, before the Kiwanis club yesterday, George Simpson, of Ottawa, president of the Ontario Kiwanis cultural society, was the speaker.

Mr. Simpson pointed out the economic side of beauty, and that home gardening was therefore worthwhile, declared that beauty should be unhampered and free, admitted that "proper regulation and control" of business as "disagreeable and expensive," and expressed the belief that, judged by its conduct during the last few years, business can be trusted to keep its own house in order.

There were also many slides of different types of flowers. Mr. Simpson explained and pointing out the points of beauty in each, and showing their suitability in gardening.

The use of stone-work in gardening was recommended. If it were naturalistic and not artificial, it can be used for flagging, gates, rock gardens, drive boundaries and pools.

He appealed to the club as an organization trying to improve civic conditions, to do their utmost to make their property beautiful. "Everybody seems to complain about some ugly spot, but nobody seems to feel it is their duty to see that the place is made beautiful. The Kiwanis constitute an immovable force and they cannot be stopped by anything, therefore they are the most logical people to attend to such conditions."

Dr. Alfred Grant made an appeal for the Kiwanis to give their support to the nurse's home, in the coming vote. Miss Hazel Hunt played several numbers on the piano, which were much appreciated. Rev. Hays was the booster for the day, and gave an interesting account of the success of his business, Russell Wright, Gib. Ward and Dr. Sweeney were the winners of the drawing.
