

## BRITISH IMMIGRANTS TO GET CHEAP FARES

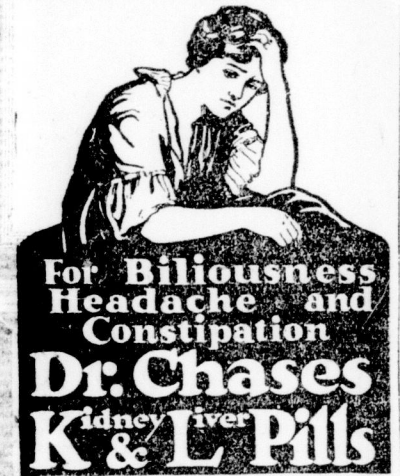
Canadian Government Arranges Lower Ocean Rates From Old Country.

### NEED SUITABLE TYPES

Dominion Aims To Encourage Influx of Anglo-Saxon Settlers.

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, Jan. 8.—As a result of efforts of Hon. J. A. Robb, minister of immigration and colonization, a twenty per cent preference rate on Atlantic passages for all British immigrants settling in Canada has been arranged. This "British preference" will come into effect March 1, and continue until the end of the main immigration season November 1. It will apply only to British immigrants coming direct to Canada from the British Isles and will affect all lines from Britain to Canadian Atlantic ports. All British settlers, by this arrangement, will be enabled to come to Canada at \$15 per passage less than immigrants from other countries will have to pay.

It is the policy of Mr. Robb and the government, it is intimated, to keep the increasing tide of immigration as far as possible preponderantly British, and special attention has been given to encouraging by propa-

## SIR ADAM STATES MILLIONS WILL BE SPENT FOR POWER

Outlines Various Plans To Be Proposed For Hydro Development.

### FERGUSON SPEAKS

Canadian Press Despatch. Chippawa, Jan. 8.—Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission, has plans for the expenditure of millions of dollars in extending the scope of the municipally-owned power system of the province, he announced today on the occasion of the opening by Premier Ferguson today of the sixth unit of the Queenston-Chippawa plant, capable of generating 55,000 horsepower. Sir Adam said the hydro commission would shortly present the following proposals to the Ontario cabinet for its authorization:

Authorization would be asked for units Nos. 9 and 10 of the Chippawa plant, which would bring the total capacity by 1925 up to 365,000 horsepower.

**Build Steam Plants.** An item of from ten to twelve million dollars would be inserted in the hydro estimates to inaugurate the policy of auxiliary steam plants. The Ontario cabinet would be asked within the next few days to approve a dam proposition to be located near Morrisburg, which would make possible a 700,000 horsepower development on the St. Lawrence River.

Sir Adam made brief reference to the Niagara plant, declaring that to-day it was carrying itself and that as soon as its capacity should be doubled, it would be on a paying basis.

The prospects of a power shortage were stressed by Sir Adam as serious. Even if the St. Lawrence development were started immediately, he emphasized the growing demands of a period of industrial inactivity could not be met.

**Ferguson Speaks.** Premier Ferguson, addressing the gathering, made no specific reference to the proposals which Sir Adam had tentatively held out. He declared generally that the government was fully sensible of the vital necessity of an adequate power supply and was determined that every step necessary to secure it would be taken.

Particularly did he strongly hold that the St. Lawrence must be exploited. He believed the Dominion government to be sympathetic to the scheme, but he added: "If for any reason the federal authorities should say that they are unwilling to participate, the province will find the means of financing the scheme itself."

## TRUST COMPANY DROPS MILLION DOLLAR SUIT

Memphis, Tenn., Jan. 8.—Announcement was made in federal court here this afternoon that the suit of \$1,000,000, filed by the American Trust Company of Nashville, Tenn., against the Piggly-Wiggly Corporation had been settled by compromise, and that suit would be withdrawn.

## CANADA'S DEBT SHOWS INCREASE

During the Month of December Alone \$896,676 Was Added.

### INLAND REVENUE BIG

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, Jan. 8.—The net debt of Canada on December 31, last, was \$2,415,538,100. This is an increase of \$3,041,940 over the total net debt a year ago.

During the month of December alone the increase in the net debt amounted to \$896,676. During the nine months of the fiscal year ending December 31, 1922, revenue totalled \$300,174,050, while in the similar period ending December 31, last, the total was \$208,310,718, an increase of \$81,863,332. Ordinary expenditure, on the other hand shows a decrease of \$2,508,436, as compared with the nine-month period last year. Expenditures on ordinary account amounted to \$241,868,471 during the nine-month period of 1922, while in the 1923 period they totalled \$239,458,035.

The outstanding feature on the revenue side of the statement is the increase in inland revenue. In the nine-month period just closed inland revenue to the total of \$84,719,364 was collected, as compared with \$75,508,258 in the 1922 period. This is an increase of \$9,205,646 in favor of the present fiscal year. Customs collections showed an increase of \$2,752,216 over 1922.

## Declares Ryan Saved Relatives

Lawyer States Bandit Took Sentence To Shield Another.

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, Jan. 8.—A report from Kingston says it was learned from a most authoritative source tonight that Norman "Red" Ryan pleaded guilty in order to prevent a member of his family being brought into the robbery charge of the Bank of Nova Scotia here. The relative is declared by a police official to have driven the automobile which conveyed the four gunmen to the bank, and is also said to have helped in their escape. "Norman Ryan said himself into a life sentence and thirty straps to save a friend," is the statement of C. S. Morgan, lawyer of Hamilton, who acted for Ryan in Minneapolis and again in Toronto. Ryan's sudden change of mind this morning came as a great surprise to Mr. Morgan.

## EX-PREMIER'S HEALTH CONTINUES TO IMPROVE

Venezelos Able To Resume Conference With Political Leaders.

Associated Press Despatch. Athens, Jan. 8.—The health of Ex-Premier Venezelos, who was taken ill early this week, is continuing to improve. Yesterday he was able to resume his conference with the political leaders, including the royalists. The latter reiterated to him that it would be necessary to recall King George and then dissolve the assembly and hold new elections, in which the anti-Venezelists would participate.

## Constables Find Dead Trappers

Located in Bush and Buried by Officers.

Canadian Press Despatch. Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Jan. 8.—Provincial Constables Harry Morron and F. A. E. Morrison returned today from a trip 60 miles into the bush back of Mile Sixty, on the Algoma Central Railway, where they located and buried the remains of two men, thought to be trappers. Alex Vasseau of Blind River and Louis Louis of Cutler, who have been missing since the spring of 1922. The two constables had a very trying trip.

## Biggs Will Give Decision Shortly

Undecided About Accepting Leadership Farmer-Labor Party.

Canadian Press Despatch. Hamilton, Jan. 8.—Hon. F. C. Biggs, ex-minister of public works for Ontario, will give his decision at the end of this week as to whether or not he will accept the leadership of the Farmer-Labor party in the House. Approached on two occasions the former minister declined the office. When spoken to this afternoon he said he was considering the offer again, but would not commit himself yet.

## MILLIONS BREAK LAWS ON BETTING

British House Discusses Means To Curb Spread of Evil.

### WOMEN ARE GUILTY

Associated Press Despatch. London, Jan. 8.—Remarkable sidelights on the growth of betting in the United Kingdom, especially among women, appear in the report of the select committee of the House which was appointed some time ago to inquire into the matter with a view to the possible imposition by the government of a tax on betting. The committee's report was issued today. The committee, at its final meeting, intimated that a tax on betting was practicable, but the dissolution of Parliament prevented them from sufficiently considering the draft report of the chairman, Sir H. S. Cautley, who proposed state control of betting and a scheme of taxation. The report states: "There is a continual breaking of the law by millions of people by betting in the streets and surreptitious passing of betting slips, and the constant endeavor to avoid the police must have a most demoralizing effect on children and establishments of law and order, and a weakening of respect for the law."

## ZIONISTS COMMEND RULE IN PALESTINE

Convention in Toronto Lauds Britain's Handling Holy Land Affairs.

Toronto, Jan. 8.—The nineteenth convention of Zionists at the closing session today unanimously adopted a resolution expressing gratitude to Great Britain for the manner in which the mandate for Palestine has been carried out, and expressing confidence that Britain would always observe the principles underlying the mandate. Resolutions were also passed whereby the organization will be placed on a more efficient basis in Canada, one aiming to obtain the active interest of all Jews here in the Zionist movement. Officers chosen are: A. J. Freeman, Ottawa, president; Louis Fitch, Montreal, and H. E. Wilder, Winnipeg, vice-presidents; A. Levin, Montreal, honorary treasurer; Louis Fitch, Montreal, executive secretary. Mark Workman, Montreal, was chosen honorary president and Lyon Cohen, Montreal, vice-president. In addition to these men, a national council was formed of representatives from the eastern, central and western sections of Canada.

## PRESBYTERIANS REGRET "RED" RYAN PUBLICITY

Feel Press Gave Undue Prominence in Case of Notorious Bandit.

Toronto, Jan. 8.—The Toronto Presbytery, according to a resolution adopted at their meeting today "observes with regret and deplors the recent tendency on the part of the press to give undue prominence and emphasis to criminal escapades, being convinced that such presentations tend to glorify crime and criminals and to rouse lawless instincts in the minds of youth." During the meeting the publicity given to the "Red" Ryan case was cited as an example of the prominence given to such news by the press.

## MAJESTIC HOURS LATE DUE TO TERRIFIC SEAS

Messages Report Liner Slowed To Eight Knots An Hour.

New York, Jan. 8.—Howling head gales from the northwest whirling up terrific seas have delayed the steamship Majestic, due in quarantine this morning, more than 36 hours, and the big liner, with 1,625 passengers aboard, will be unable to dock until tomorrow morning, company officials said today.

## PRISONER IS PAROLED AFTER THIRTEEN YEARS

Arthur Bonnar Released From Kingston Serving 28-Year Term.

Kingston, Jan. 4.—Arthur Bonnar, who with the notorious Meum brothers, made a sensational escape from the Portsmouth Penitentiary on the forenoon of April 29, 1912, and was captured an hour or so later, was paroled from the penitentiary on Monday, after serving 13 years of a 20-year sentence.

Bonnar, regarded as a clever man, was serving eight years for horse thieving, and at the time he was brought to Portsmouth was credited with having escaped from jail three times.

## BAD BLAZE IN LONDON FINALLY EXTINGUISHED

Buildings Burned Extended Over An Area of a Quarter of a Mile.

Associated Press Despatch. London, Jan. 8.—The fire, which has been raging since yesterday afternoon along the Thames in the neighborhood of West India docks, was extinguished at noon today. Buildings extending over an area of a quarter of a mile were consumed by the flames. The damage is estimated at more than \$200,000. The firemen labored throughout last night in relays, trying to stop the spread of fire and keep it from coming into contact with the adjoining warehouses. Floods of water and good numbers of firemen tonight were watching the smoldering ruins, amid the fumes of frizzling rubber coming from one of the largest buildings destroyed.
