Typhoid Fever and the Oyster. According to a special cable to the New York Herald the death of the Dean of Winchester, said to be due to typhoid fever following the eating of contaminated oysters, has created a very sensational scare throughout

Although the gravity of the situation is naturally very much exaggerated, there is also a plausibility in the conclusion that the shellfish in question is a distinct and dangerous factor in fever propagation.

It has been proved, for instance, beyond question that oysters which are fattened at the mouths of fresh water rivers, containing sewage waste, are liable to absorb the typhoid germ and thus scatter it widecast among innocent and distant consumers. On general principles it is obvious-

ly impossible to be sure in any given case that an oyster is free from infection unless implicit reliance can placed upon the integrity of the aler, who may know the exact source of supply. In deep sea water the oyster is always free from infection, and until there shall be some legislation to prevent the present practice of transplanting in contaminated streams, it is easy to see which will be the popular choice. Thus the fattened, plump product of the sewer will very naturally give place to one that brings freshness and flavor from a purer and more remote environ-
