Cotton Acreage. New Orleans, May 31.—The Southern Cotton Association today issued its cot-ton acreage report. The report says: "The estimated acreage for 1904, as indicated by the report of the United States gov-ernment, amounted to 31,730,000 acres. The acreage this year at 25,930,951 acres, a decrease of 18.48 per cent., and 18.05 per cent. in fertilizers."

Lodz, Russian Poland, May 31.—A conflict between strikers and Cossacks occurred todet. The soldiers were ston-ed by a slow of med who were arring to bring out some weavars who were at work, whereupon the troops fired, killing two men and wounding six. A condition almost approaching anarchy exists here. The strikers appear to have supreme control. They are forcing the manufac-turers to close their mills, and the manu-facturers are urging the governor to proclaim martial law. In one instance, the strikers forcibly ejected a military guard from a mill. A regiment of caval-ry, arrived here this afternoon.
