Visiting the alleged place to which Tecumseh's remains are stated to have been taken after disinterment at Moraviantown. The bones unearthed at the spot on St. Anne's Island are positively claimed by the Indians to be those of the dead Chief. Though there is strong reason to believe this may have been the place of final sepulture, the story is shrouded in obscurity. There seems to be little likelihood of Tecumseh's last sepulchre ever being positively located.
