### CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS.

OSTARIO.

There are no visible signs of weakness in the pine lumber market. All grades are firm and moving quite actively. Persons who earlier in the year predicted lower prices have now changed their attitude towards the market, and expect the sustenance of present prices at least. Good crops throughout the proxince have inspired confidence in a continuance of business prosperity. A large manufacthrer who sold his season's production of pine lumber carly in the season tells us that he is constantly in receipt of letters from dealers and customers to the effect that they would regard it as a favor if he could supply them with a certain quantity of lumber. This, perhaps more than anything else, illustrates the strength of the market. There are practically no large blocks of lumber that have not passed out of first hands. Log run pine delivered on the water's edge of the Georgian Bay has been sold as high as \$23.

The activity in hardwoods is looked upon in a very favorable light. There will doubtless be a heavy consumption of hardwood lumber this fall for building and factory purposes, and the supply of stock will be none too great to go round. Some of the standard varieties are likely to witness a further advance.

QUEDEC AND NEW BRUNSWICK.

There has been quite active buying of spruce lumber of late and the mills will likely go into the winter with very light stocks. Prices have gradually strengthened and are now at a point where they represent a fan margin of profit to manufacturers. Shipments from Montreal to the British market are quite active, although the total for the season will probably show a falling off as compared with last year. In spruce elaphoards we find an extraordinary condition of affairs. The supply is insufficient to meet the demand; in fact there is something closely resembling a dearth. Where the supply for the fall and winter trade will come from is a question. Shingles continue strong on the basis of \$3.50 to \$3.60 fer extras on Boston freight rate. It is predicted that there will be an advance in cedar shingles in September, when dealers commence to buy for the fall trade.

MANITORA AND BRITISH COLUMBIA.

The active building movement in all parts of the west has created a demand for lumber which mills have much difficulty in meeting. So great has been the pressure upon stocks that prices have again advanced and are now \$1 per thousand
