almost equally prominent from three sides. By taking advantage of the extreme slope of the lot, the garage is incorporated into the house under the service wing.

The sun room, dining room, and hall all look out on a small formal garden suggestive of the Italian, and terraced up to the upper level of the lot some 20 feet above where it is terminated by an old stone wall hidden by a screen plantation.

Quite a lot of the landscape work is yet to be carried out to complete the scheme.

The main walls of the house are a combination of tapestry brick and terra cotta tile, while the floors are of

wooden joist construction. The stone used on the exterior is Indiana lime stone.

The interior wood work, with the exception of the living room, is finished in white pine enamelled in ivory. The living room has a pilaster wall treatment supporting a wooden cornice, the material being of oak and the intervening space between the pilasters is covered with grass cloth. The electric fixtures were made from designs by the architect and are suggestive of the days of coal oil lamps.

The main staircase is of pine with mahogany newels, rails and treads. The walls of the halls are covered with a very dark blue



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
