#### SOCIAL SECURITY

SUGGESTED PROVISION OF GRANT TO ELDERLY TO HEAT HOMES—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

Since the federal government has now completed energy agreements with the producing provinces and will get a great deal of additional cash as a result; since the price of home heating fuels this winter will rise faster than the pensions of our old people; and in view of the fact that the Prime Minister (Mr. Trudeau) said last night that scarce tax dollars must be spent first on those who need help most, and that those who are stronger must carry more of the load, I move, seconded by the hon. member for Hamilton Mountain (Mr. Deans):

That this House urge that Canada's seniors, unlike the oil companies which are now getting a generous guaranteed income, be given a specific grant in the forthcoming budget in addition to the guaranteed income supplement so that they can afford to heat their homes this winter.

### THE ECONOMY

PRIME MINISTER'S SPEECH IN TORONTO—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

Mr. David Kilgour (Edmonton-Strathcona): Madam Speaker, inflation is now running at about 13 per cent on a yearly basis and is reducing the living standard of virtually every Canadian within the government's reach. In the past 12 months the largest contributors to increases in our consumer prices have been Ottawa-set interest rates which are up by fully 50 per cent, and Ottawa-set energy prices which are up by fully 33 per cent even before the new energy agreement begins to operate.
