**THREE YEARS FOR BOY WHO STOLE**

Lad Was Caught at Brampton and Sent to Mimico.

BRAMPTON, June 9.—(Special.)—Magistrate Crawford on Saturday sentenced a young lad, 15 years of age, named John Beard, to three years in Mimico Industrial School, for a theft of \$200 from J. A. McBride o' Belfount.

The boy disappeared on Wednesday. Mr. McBride missed the money shortly afterwards. Thinking he would be gone to Georgetown and on his way to "Brotherly Love" he noticed Chief Kidd of Brampton to be on the look-out. The surmise was correct, and Beard was arrested on the arrival of the 4 o'clock train and placed in jail.
