WASHINGTON July 9.—Interstate commerce has made public an abstract of its report for year ended June 30, 1913, covering all railways having operating revenue above \$100,000. The average rate of dividends paid on all stocks outstanding pertaining to roads under consideration was 4.28 per cent. Operating revenues of railways in United States for year ended June 30, 1913, were \$3,125,126,758 and operating expenses \$2,169,968,924. Corresponding returns for 1912 were: operating revenue \$2,826,963,366, and operating expenses \$1,959,994,658.
