

**AUSTRIANS FORCED TO BEAT RETREAT**

General Ivanoff Wins Successes in Galicia, Checking Von Mackenzen.

**BULGARIA DOUBTFUL**

Talk of Her Attacking Greece and Serbia Discounted in London.

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Ivanoff is still keeping Field Marshal von Mackenzen at arm's length from the fortress of Rovno, the key to the route to Kiev, and in counter-attacks has retaken a number of villages both in Volhynia and Galicia.

It seems adjacent from the inability of the Austro-Germans to hold their positions in the southern area that they sent reinforcements from that front to Field Marshal von Hindenburg's northern army, which, as heretofore, is expected to score the biggest successes.

**PROMINENT ORGANIST DEAD AT LONDON, ONT.**

Dr. George Sippl Was Long Connected With St. Paul's Cathedral.

LONDON, Ont., Sept. 19.—Dr. Geo. Buckley Sippl, from 1876 until 1913 organist and choirmaster of St. Paul's Cathedral, this city, and one of the best known musicians in Canada, was stricken with apoplexy in the public library building yesterday afternoon, and died seven minutes later.

**PARIS, Sept. 19.—An official Belgian communication says:**

"The night of Sept. 17-18 was calm. This morning there was a bombardment of slight intensity of several of our advanced posts, as well as at Pervyse. A bombardment more sustained occurred in the region to the south of Dixmude.

**OTTAWA, Sept. 19.—Details of Australia's splendid record in raising men for overseas service given by the Canadian trade commissioner in Melbourne.**

He states that on Aug. 12 the commonwealth had organized, equipped and despatched 76,566 troops for active service abroad. At that time 40,400 troops were in training camps in Australia for despatch to the front.

**FLYING CORPS TO GULF**

At the request of the Government of India, a section of the Australian Flying Corps was despatched to the Persian Gulf, and is working in conjunction with the Royal Air Force.

In addition to artillery and other equipment, the whole of the troops have to be clothed and fitted out with the latest fighting kits.

**HEARD FIRST TIME IN NEW PASTORATE**

Rev. R. B. Cochrane Occupies Pulpit in College Street Presbyterian.

**GIVEN WARM WELCOME**

Large Congregations Hear Pastor at Morning and Evening Services.

Rev. R. B. Cochrane preached his first sermon at College Street Presbyterian Church as pastor yesterday, and at both the morning and evening services large congregations welcomed him.

A pleasing personality, coupled with a convincing manner of speaking, made a very favorable impression at once.

"I do not believe in threatening men into heaven," he said at last night's service, "but rather by love would I see them enter, and it is the same with God. He sees everything in every mortal that is worthy of saving, and to show His faith and everlasting love in mankind He sent Jesus Christ to live and die for us."

Rev. Mr. Cochrane had taken his text from the second chapter of Ezekiel, verse eight, and the subject was "Hunger of God." He based his remarks on the welcome afforded the prodigal son on his return to his father.

He impressed the fact that it could not be happiness or wealth or any of the worldly substance that God hungers for, but rather three things—love that trusts, for love cannot think his way to heaven, but one can love his way to God; second, a love that confesses, not that of professed Christians who are afraid to make their love of God known; and love that serves, one that accomplishes deeds of kindness and unselfishness for others.

The value of the Canadian youth, he said, who went forth to serve his country should be the same spirit shown by church members in their work for their religion.

"God hungers that that spirit that is willing to sacrifice our own personal interests and do battle for others' interests. As God lavishes so much love upon us and cries for our love in return, it is but just that we should dedicate the best services of our life to Him."

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The government was determined to continue to train, equip and transport to the seat of war every available man presenting himself for service who succeeded in passing the necessary medical examination.

Big Forces Raised. To date the grand total of the Australian expeditionary forces raised has reached 117,000 men, excluding 8000 troops of the citizen forces mobilized for home defence.

Reinforcements are going forward at the rate of 8300 a month, and this number will be increased to 10,600 in October and 10,600 in November.

The various divisions comprise infantry, light horse, ammunition columns, artillery, engineers, army medical corps, flying corps, veterinary sections, bridging, train and pay corps.
