Mystery Over Balkans.
The political situation in the Balkans is still shrouded with considerable mystery. The Bulgarins, having secured what they wanted from Turkey in the cession of a railway line, appear to be well satisfied for the present. But there is now talk in Berlin of the Bulgarians taking by force, if they cannot get it otherwise, the portions of Macedonia taken from them by the Serbians and Greeks during the last Balkan war. It is asserted that the Bulgarians have called to the colors all the Macedonian recruits now in Bulgaria, and that generally there is a warlike feeling in existence among the Bulgars.
With Bulgaria surrounded by Ser-

bia, Greece and Roumania, and her coasts open to attack by Anglo-French, Italian and Russian fleets, however, it is believed here that Bulgaria will hesitate before throwing in her lot with the central powers and

That Turkey is declared to be having her own troubles over the cession of the Dedeaghatch Railway, is resported. The Mussulman population in this strip of land is said to be in revolt against being placed under the Bulgarian Government.

AUSTRALIA RAISES CREDITABLE ARMY

Seventy-Six Thousand Troops Sent Abroad by Middle of August.

OTTAWA, Sept. 19 - Details of Australia's splendid record in raising men for overseas service are given by the Canadian trade Melbourne. He states that on Aug. 12 the commonwealth had equipped and despatched 76,566 troops for active service abroad. At that time 40,400 troops were in training camps in Australia for despatch to the front. The government was determined to continue to train, equip and transport to the seat of war every available man presenting himself for service who succeeded in passing the necessary medical examination. Big Forces Raised.

To date the grand total of the Ausralian expeditionary forces raised has reached 117,000 men, excluding 8000 roops of the citizen forces mobilized for home defence. Reinforcements are going forward at the rate of 5300 month, and this number will be increased to 10,600 in October and 10,600 n November. The various divisions comprise in-

fantry, light horse, ammunition columns, artillery, engineers, army medi cal corps, flying corps, veterinary sections, bridging, train and pay corps.

Flying Corps to Gulf.

At the request of the Government of India, a section of the Australian Flying Corps was despatched to the Persian Gulf, and is working in conjunction with the Royal Flying Corps. Further reinforcements are to be sent. In addition to artillery and other equipment, the whole of the troops have to be clothed and fitted out with \$413.67, of which \$277.40 is the cost prior to embarkation. Some 24,000 horses have ben sent abroad, and there were still about 6600 remounts. maining in Australia to fill future re quirements. This horse establishment had necessitated the purchase of enormous quantities of forage.
