

Kertk, a French Huguenot refugee from Dieppe, who had been commissioned by Charles I. By the treaty of St. Germain-en-laye, in 1632, it reverted again to the French." In the year 1829, the only permanent inhabitants at Tadoussac were the residents at the Hudson Bay Company's trading post, now it is a pretty village with two Churches. —The one near the Tadoussac Hotel stands on the site of the old Chapel of the Holy Cross, the first sacred edifice erected on the shores of the St. Lawrence. It was unfortunately destroyed by fire about 1688. The present building is worthy a visit on account of some old oil paintings which adorn its interior. The Hotel is under the management of mine host Browning, of the Ottawa Hotel, Montreal, and there cannot be a better conducted hostelry—the rooms are clean and spacious, the table is well supplied, and the servants are civil and obliging. Boats and Canoes can be obtained upon application at the office of the Hotel, and they are necessary not only for fishing, but for the exploration of the many picturesque spots near this "cradle of Canadian civilization."
