Halfway down the hall, on the west side of the building, a commodious dais was erected, from which the speaking took place. The floor was covered with green and the facing with red balsam. Over the platform the Dominion ensign was suspended, and immediately below were placed the Royal Arms, and the following motto:

"Alexander Mackenzie, a true man and first-rate mechanic, Chief of the State, our young Dominion." In gas illumination in front the letters "V.R." were conspicuous, supporting a centre piece consisting of a beautifully designed crown and star. Immediately over the platform was suspended a "seven-pound loaf" which, according to an appropriate motto, was received by workingmen under "a Revenue Tariff," whilst a diminutive crusty one-pound loaf alone was supplied to feed the families of unemployed workmen under a "Protective Tariff." Over the bandstand flamed a gas illumination forming the word "Welcome." Around the hall were displayed a number of mottoes, among which were the following:—"Our ships, fisheries, and foreign commerce," "Welcome! Industry! Intelligence! Integrity!" "Protection to the workingman, \$1 per barrel duty on flour," "Agriculture and manufactures," "Canada our home," "Ships, fisheries, and foreign commerce," "Our exhaustless resources—coal, iron, copper, silver, gold," "Protection to the workingman—75 cents per ton duty on coal."
